THE following editorial comment from the Oregonian is one of the best arguments for free trade, we have seen for some time:

The war on the sugar trust has begun over, and it will never stop for long at a time till the monopoly is broken down.

When it is understood that the reason everybody can import raw sugar is because trade in that commodity is absolutely free, the question naturally arises, why, if free sugar makes a trust impossible, it would not be equally beneficial and equally hard on the trusts to have everything else free.

DEMOCRACY AND REPUBLICANISM

The Republican party believes that the government has a right in the name of protection to tax the people to that degree that domestic manufacturers may establish enormous industries, which in turn combines to form trusts and syndicates and monopolies, which plunder the people, exclude foreign competition, and build up monstrous private fortunes.

The Democratic party now and ever has believed that taxation should be limited by the needs of the government, justly and economically administered; that the government has no right to exact one dollar of tax from one man to build up the private fortune of another man under any pretext of the general good; that excessive taxation is robbery and tends to the establishment of classes, a condition abhorrent to free men and destructive to greatness.

The county ticket put forward last Saturday, at Dallas, by the Democrats, is a strong one. No ring nominations cling about this ticket. In fact, we are pleased to say that the Democrats in Polk county have no rings. The fair distribution of these nominations is apparent to all.

THE FINAL SITUATION.

Since Bro. B. F. Bonnell, in his three-column reply in the last week's Progress, has so completely lost his bearings in conducting a decent discussion concerning a question of national concern, and since his reply is full to overflowing of slurs and insinuations unbecoming one of his cloth, and further, since he not only classes us with evil doers, but says—

Those fellows down at Sioux City who killed Haddock are not Prohibitionists, neither are they Republicans, but they are all Democrats the same as Bro. Bell and the WEST SIDE.

And further says, that "the Democratic party of Iowa since 1886, has stood firmly planted against the state prohibitory law, and the WEST SIDE will show either its ignorance or its dishonesty if it undertakes to deny it."

It is amusing to hear some of our Republican friends make the "strong" argument, as they call it, to vote for Mr. Key, the nominee of their party for state senator, on the ground that the "next Oregon legislature will be Republican beyond a doubt," and therefore he would have "more influence" in behalf of Polk county than Hon. N. L. Butler, the Democratic nominee. Now if our friends are really in earnest, let us ask them to take a dose of their own medicine. Here it is. The lower house of congress has 157 Democratic majority; therefore if Oregon expects any aid she should send a Democrat there instead of Mr. Hermann, a Republican. What "influence" can Mr. Hermann have there with such a large Democratic majority against him? Will our Republican friends vote for the Democratic nominee for congress, on the same theory they argue in behalf of Mr. Key? Of course not. This is only sophistry. The argument is as fallacious in Mr. Hermann's case as it is in that of Mr. Butler. N. L. Butler can do more for the interests of Polk county in the next Oregon legislature, whether it is Democratic or Republican, than any man we could possibly send there at present. Mr. Butler knows our needs as no other man knows them or can know them, unless he has the same experience that Mr. Butler has in all these relations. His knowledge of legislative affairs peculiarly fit him for state senator to represent Polk county in our next legislative assembly, and it would be a great mistake for the voters of Polk county to fail to see this. Much of the above applies with equal force to the representatives on the Democratic ticket. Our legislative ticket has "been there" before, and will serve us with fidelity again.
