The total number reported injured was 29,025, of whom 27,394 were employes, 2,425 were passengers, 4,206 were unclassified. During the year 369 employes were killed, and 7,842 injured,in coupling and uncoupling cars. There can be no doubt that a large proportion of these fatalities and injuries would not have occurred if automatic couplers had been in universal use.




