HIS OWN MONUMENT.

The Grand Legacy R. S. Wallace
Left to Polk County.

FOOTPRINTS ON SANDS OF TIME.

The Delightful Home, Large Orchards, and
Elegant Drives on the Farm of
Mrs. R. S. Wallace.

For several weeks past a representa-
tive of the West Side has been visit-
ing portions of Polk county, in the
interest of the paper and from time to
time we propose to give the results
his observations.

In his rounds he came to the farm
formerly owned and controlled by the
Hon. R. S. Wallace—now—deceased—
but now operated by his widow Mrs.
Wallace in the same line of operations
that actuated Mr. Wallace during his
life time. In speaking of a visit there
the writer says: The farm and sur-
roundings presenting such an attractive
appearance, we were induced to call at
the family residence with a view to
gain some particulars with reference to
operations carried on, on the farm,
hoping thereby, we might find some
matters of interest worthy of publica-
tion which would interest your readers.

The farm proper consists of 330 acres,
and is beautifully situated about three
miles below Salem. From the west
end of the Salem bridge to the farm is
a fine gravelled road, the sole work of
R. S. Wallace, who in his life time as-
sumed the task and responsibility of
keeping that road in a good state of
repair. For this spirit of generosity
and enterprise manifested by him, he
is entitled to and does receive the hearty
commendation of the people. This
road will compare in smoothness and
solidity with any road in the state.

On the farm are 12,000 pear trees,
of uniform growth, so arranged and set
out as to make continuous straight rows
viewing them from any of the four
points of the compass.

There are also 3,000 apple trees, 2,000
cherry trees and 1,000 peach trees, all
of which are in a high state of cultivation.
This farm is virtually one complete
orchard, and the order of its arrange-
ment indicates industry and a knowl-
edge of horticulture in an eminent de-
gree. The land is thoroughly culti-
vated, well watered, and altogether
free from noxious weeds. In fact, it
presents to the eye of the passer-by a
broad expanse of fruit trees, highly
cultivated, and comparable with the
prettiest garden spot in the country.

The farm has been occupied seven
years by the "Wallace" family, and
during those seven years, no want of
energy and expense has intervened to
make it the model farm of Polk county.
Order and industry seem to be the
watchwords, and from our observation,
all seems to go along with clock-work
regularity. Casting our eyes over this
vast field of young fruit trees, we could
but imagine what immense quantities
of luscious fruit would be plucked
from their branches in the years to
come, and what a handsome revenue
would be derived therefrom even at
very moderate prices. In a few years,
these 330 acres, planted in choice fruits
will produce a revenue to its proprie-
tors, exceeding in amount that pro-
duced from three times the amount of
land planted to cereals.

To carry on the operations of this
farm, from ten to twelve hands are
employed the year around, and each
hand is allotted his particular work, and
all appear to vie, one with the other,
to prompt and advance the interests of
their employer. Standing on the
porch of their beautiful residence and
viewing the surroundings, all seems
to betoken plenty, prosperity and domes-
tic enjoyment.

The constant work of five teams are
required for the various purposes of the
farm, and their sleek and glossy hides
give evidence that they are well cared
for.

We shall always call to mind, with a
sense of pleasure, our visit to "The
Willows," the name given to the Wal-
lace farm, and the kind consideration
extended to us by the family resident
there, and we look forward in pleasing
anticipation of the time when baby
springs in the flush of beauty, shall
again adorn those trees with their
brightest foliage, and we can once more
visit the place where we beheld scenery
 seldom presented to the eye of the
traveler.

We have referred to the road from the
west end of the Salem bridge to the
"Wallace" farm as being kept in good
repair solely and alone by the Wal-
lace's. In addition to this work, the
estate is assessed for seventy days
garden on the public road. This work is
given cheerfully and with a disposi-
tion, which, if fully followed by all
others, would make "Old Polk" the
happiest county in the state for good
roads, for the transportation of produce
to market.

Let us not close this communication
without some reference to the Salem
bridge. After leaving the Wallace resi-
dence we crossed that bridge, and in
crossing we made some hasty observa-
tion as to its condition, and as to its
safety from the effects of another flood.
The result of our observation was, that
it required a thorough examination by
competent workmen, for in our cross-
ing we were impressed with appearance
of weakness in parts, and also with the
thought, that from want of care and
attention, that another flood would
sweep it from its moorings.

The people of Polk county are in-
debted in great part to the spirit and
energy of R. S. Wallace for the con-
summation of that once greatly desired
object of a free bridge across the Wil-
lamette at Salem. It was to his in-
imitable spirit of enterprise, as much
as to any one man living, that that
object was carried into effect. One bridge
has been swept away, let Polk county,
join hands with Salem and Marion
counties, and work together for their
mutual benefit, and take such action
as will result in placing that bridge
beyond a peradventure of its meeting
with disaster from swelling floods.
Let no contention exist between Polk
and Marion counties, as to the duty
each is to perform respecting the stabi-
lity and security of the bridge from
any anticipated flood.
