THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

Correspondence from Washington Relative to the Prospects of New Legislation.

It is more than likely that the fifty-third congress will be convened in extraordinary session immediately after the inauguration of President Cleveland. The senate will, of course, be assembled to act upon the nominations and messages of the new executive, while the presence of the house will be needed to legislate on once upon the legislation in which the democratic party stands pledged, and which its control of all the branches of the legislature will enable it to put into effect.

The result of the election does not lead to any great liberty on the part of employees in the government, but still, at the same time, there is not that feeling of depression which in former times fell upon the departments when the employees were brought face to face with a change that meant a possible loss of their positions.

Mr. Cleveland will return to Washington with as happy anticipations as those in which the president elect has such good reasons to indulge.

The election to congress from the Tenth district of New York of General Daniel E. Sickles, has revived the question as to the right of an officer on the retired list of the army to a seat in congress, in view of the constitutional provision that "no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house of congress during his continuance in office."

The Nation's Share of the Benefits Will Overbalance the Outlay.

Why should the great republic alone among civilized countries be denied the blessing of good roads?
