In Bermuda, according to consul Sullivan report to this government, under what is known as the alien act no person who was not born on British soil or is not a British subject can purchase and hold land in Bermuda. Permanent investment in realty by a foreigner is not allowed. Why does not the United States pass such an alien law? Tax all lands owned by foreigners so high that they will have to be returned to the government, and then let the government let anyone use them who will pay the government ground rent. Millions of acres now held by foreigners on speculation or to rent out to tenants, would then be open to use by our needy citizens.

THROUGH the kindness of Senator Mitchell at Washington we have a report from the consuls of the United States. From the report of the consul to Austria Hungary we learn that masons are paid 35 cents per day, carpenters 33 cents, and printers 42 cents per day for men and 21 cents for women. The average wages for working people are 28 and 25 cents per day. How would our people live on such pittance?

Printing Inks.

Not one printer in a dozen can tell how the ink he uses is made. He buys it already prepared and never stops to ask how it was made. Here is the receipt: Set on the fire in a large iron pot, two gallons of clear linseed oil, boil and stir until it smokes, then ignite it; remove it from the fire and let it burn until a sample will draw into strings between the fingers. Put a lid on to extinguish the flames, then add 1 pound of resin to each quart of oil; dissolve, and add gradually in strips 1 1/2 lbs. of soap; heat the pot until the solution is complete when the varnish is ready. Two sorts are kept, one thick, and the other thin so as to mix when required; the difference is caused in the boiling and fire being kept up for different periods. For making black ink mix together mineral lamp-black, 8 lbs., vegetable black, 7 lbs., indigo and Prussian blue, of each 5 oz., Indian red, 2 oz., grind this with sufficient varnish, gradually adding as the grinding goes on. For colored inks use colored pigments.
