Mrs. Bunn, of North Yamhill, visited with her daughters, who are attending the Normal, last week.

Mrs. E. C. Perival will do dressmaking—cutting and fitting in the latest styles—at her residence.

The Christian church here is now on wheels, and is being moved to a lot on the southwest part of the square.

The Misses Mary and Nettie Kibbey, of Hoskins, visited their aunt Mrs. R. C. Perival last Thursday and Friday.

The prune crop of Oregon this year is estimated at 2,500,000 pounds, of which 1,000,000 pounds are Italiana.
