The Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. held a joint meeting at the Christian church last Sunday afternoon. A very profitable session was held. A. E. Pender gave an interesting account of the convention recently held at Albany.

A Nursery Here.

An enterprise was inaugurated here this week by Prof. B. L. Murphy and E. G. Ogle which promises to be of much local and incidentally of not a little outside interest to this town. It is a nursery and a floral department. Although but five acres will be utilized for a beginning, it is intended to reach out later for a share of the outside patronage. It is an industry much needed on the West Side and will also be a good advertisement for this section, besides give an impetus to the planting of more and larger orchards which will develop one of the richest sections of the Willamette valley. The business manager, J. M. Ogle, is also proprietor of the well-known Puyallup nursery and the Puyallup-Yakima nursery at North Yakima, and thoroughly understands the business in all its branches, having been identified with this class

of work for over forty years. B. L. Murphy, the other partner, has been for several years, principal of our public school and is universally esteemed. This industry will no doubt be the means of directing many of the large farms and converting them into numerous orchards, prosperous homes and greatly increasing the country's list of taxpayers. The firm will be christened The J. M. Ogle Nursery Company. Our people should help this new industry as it will tend to promote home industry and to keep our money at home and incidentally have a show to get it back again.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—An order issued today by Postmaster-General Blaine amends the postal regulations as to sample copies so as to provide that extra copies of a second class publication sent by the publisher and circulated directly or indirectly through some arrangement with parties concerned under offer or agreement to distribute a certain number of copies in excess of the number of subscribers, the extra copies so issued shall not be regarded as sample copies, but subject to postage at the rate of 1 cent for each four ounces or fraction thereof sent to a single address.

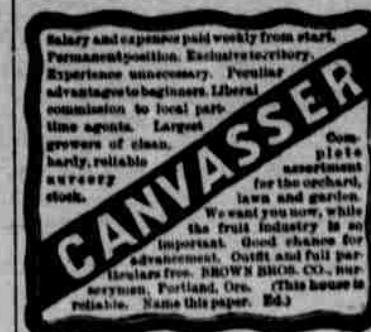
