Dalrymple, of Albany, made an eloquent populist speech at Suver on Monday last week. James McTimmonds has a diminutive hop yard, consisting of one acre, but in time he will "get there!" Milt Grant and Silas Hart, with the assistance of hounds, killed a black bear in McTimmond's valley Sunday before last. A. M. (Mox) Kau, well known in Buena Vista, is "stirring" potato ground for Henry Clifford on the Little Luckiamute. If John Bressler, Millard McCaleb and C. C. Yeater could get all their "owens" they would be able to tide over all right. T. B. Sheldon recently added to his stock farm a fine pneumatic-tire sulky and "claybank" trotter, warranted to stand in any climate. Sam Tetherow Sr. is the road supervisor around Lewisville. He will gravel extensively as soon as the river bars are uncovered. Wm. Yeater, on the Little Luckiamute will put out ten acres in hops; C. C. Yeater nine acres, and Sam Davis has 100 acres in grain. The mountain girls are at home in the saddle, as well as the boys. Willis Moody and Geo. Sheldon two sprightly young men on the Little Luckiamute, were happily married last week. This seems queer for two men to marry without the aid of ladies, but this incident "isn't a patchen" to what does happen up there sometimes. The Luckiamute section of the "narrow gauge" is worked by the following white men: J. E. Chandler foreman, C. E. Taylor, M. J. Butler and J. H. Fream. The boys look well in the place of the heathen Chinese and are getting the grass well off the track and the road is in good fix. G. P. Locke, formerly of Independence, is living on his mountain farm near the Bald butte. He has 162 acres; 90 acres of tillable land and 70 of it in grain. The view is grand. Bald mountain, close by, is snow-clad, and Mary's peak, a short distance to the southwest, shows cold and rugged. John Burns, a farmer near Lewisville, owns a 40-barrel flour mill there, with J. B. Ashenfelter as the head miller. Mr. Burns is a genius and has some cleverly constructed

fencing which will raise with the water and lot drift pass. He has a fine farm and in the bottom lands is putting out Oange orange for a fence to withstand the winter overflow of the river.
