The Independence Schools Observe the Occasion. Friday, April 12th, in accordance with the laws of the state, Arbor Day was observed in a becoming manner by the schools of this city. The exercises were appropriate and tended to create in the minds of the children a patriotic feeling and a strong regard for the day and the sentiment which inspires its observance.

After the opening songs the various grades filed into the large, grassy school grounds in front of the building keeping time to the drum beaten by Master Roy Irvine, and about 1:30 p. m. the open air exercises began. The invocation was repeated in chorus by the entire school, and then followed the tree planting.
