A letter to the Statesman has the following to say concerning the charging of admission to the Campmeeting at Turner.

Davis, his sister, now of Byron Hot Springs, Col., but formerly of Turner, Marion county, Oregon, who were the original donors of the grounds and building known as the Turner Memorial Tabernacle, to the Christian church of the state of Oregon, for the purposes as set forth in the deed, as now of record in the recorder's office of the county of Marion.

The letter mentioned by Mr. Shaw bears date of Byron Hot Springs, May 21st, and is as follows: Hon. T. C. Shaw, Salem—Dear Sir and Friend:—
