An Extra Freight.

All along the S. P. line, from Portland to Ashland, freight traffic has been very heavy during the summer and fall months, says the Eugene Guard. Lately it has increased to such a volume that one train each way daily has been unable to handle it, and the Roseburg local has been hauling from two to three freight cars almost every day. But in spite of this, freight has continued to pile up all along the line. Often three or four cars have been set out at this station by the freight, and this morning five full cars were left here, being nearly half a trainload. Sixteen cars are considered a full trainload, but of late the freight has been hauling south from 35 to 40 cars. On account of the large amount of work which has accumulated, an extra freight train was today started out of Portland to clean up all along the line as far south as Ashland. This is a splendid evidence of returning prosperity. A year and a half ago the S. P. company was running a light freight each way every other day. Now a train a quarter of a mile long goes thundering across the valley each day, and every car is filled with products of the land, incoming or outgoing.

In one scene she sings Ben Bolt and her clear sweet voice captures the audience and she is called back and sings "You Can't Play in My Yard" and receives fresh plaudits. There are comedy characters in the play to cause a hearty laugh, and pathetic incidents to bring tears.

It is to be regretted that such a splendid company have not met with better appreciation. At Salem it was a \$65 house, at Albany \$46, at Corvallis \$32, and Independence \$48. Owing to the poor business McMinnville was skipped, although the company was billed for Saturday night, and the tour will be resumed in California, where it is to be hoped they will fare better, for they deserve it.

What Luxury!

The following telegram explains in part how the "relaxation" racket is worked in Oregon:

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 19.—The touch of artist's brush and the replacing of old furniture with new is materially changing the appearance of the interior of Oregon's capitol building. The offices of the secretary of state have been supplied with elegant oak-finished roller-top desks. These desks are not less useful than ornamental, as clerks can without inconvenience lock the archives of state before turning their backs.

The frescoes just finished in the official rooms occupied by the secretary challenges comparison with the work of the most finished artist. Fortunately for the state, the commissioner artist is a relative of Secretary Kincaid. He is working at a sacrifice price that saves the state a neat sum quarterly. A nicely carpeted floor, Turkish couch, divans, inviting easy-chairs, etc., make an appearance that will not suffer comparison with any state. In another part of the statehouse Mr. Kincaid has fitted up a large room in princely style. This room has been partitioned off into four compartments, that may be turned to various purposes. Two beds have been placed therein. The handwork of the artistic painter is in evidence on the walls and ceiling thereof. The hand-finished lac-mode furniture, mirrors, a body-brussels carpet of exquisite beauty, settees, easy-chairs and other furniture contribute to the scene in the reception apartment. Attached to the headpiece of the beds are electric bells, which the supreme sleeper may touch without raising from his pillow, and flood the entire room with electric light. The most fastidious must be pleased with the interior of the state house when all the rooms are furnished as are Secretary Kincaid's.

Dallas Prune Industry.

For the past week the most interesting place about Dallas has been the old Itemizer office building, says the Dallas Itemizer, and the one next to it around on Mill street. Twenty or men, woman and children have been there busy as bees packing prunes for the Eastern market. An agent of the Oregon Fruit Union, of Portland, has been here supervising the business. Nearly 2,000 crates and four times that many baskets were sent up in which to pack two car loads of fruit. Each crate holds four neatly fitting baskets and into each basket is neatly and carefully packed ninety-seven good sized prunes in three layers, the bottom layer being five prunes square each of the two above it six prunes square. There is a layer of white paper both over and under the prunes and when the top of the crate is nailed on, the package is so solid that no prunes move. Each crate has the brand of the Oregon Fruit Union. No defective or small fruit was allowed to go in any box. Many who are interested in fruit raising were there packing for the sake of the experience. By Monday's train two large Union Pacific refrigerator cars came up, and one of them left the next morning with 1,020 crates of Italian prunes belonging to these parties: Jas. Elliott II, Edwin Cad-

well 82, A. S. Crider 200, Abram Enns 140, S. P. Kimball 254, and W. P. Wright 414. The fruit union pay all expenses of packing and shipment, their managers look out for the best markets possible, and after retaining a fixed per cent for their service, turn over the net proceeds to the grower. The superintendent of the work here, Mr. Brown, said that because of injury from rain and being over ripe our prunes might not command the best prices, but he expected the raisers would net 60 cents a bushel. This year's shipment is mainly from trees four years old that had an average of forty pounds to the tree. Most of the packers did nicely this time and will do still better next year. The work is easy and pleasant and at 4 cents a crate almost anybody could earn from 75 cents to \$1 a day. Later on the union will handle any fresh or dried fruit that offers and expect to keep it up for years. The second car went out yesterday, both being loaded and well-ventilated there being strips between the layers of crates and six inch openings between the rows of them so as to give the freshest circulation of the ever cool air. Never before did so well packed car leave Dallas. They go as fast freight from Portland, with no delay anywhere. Besides being labeled with "Oregon Fruit Union" in big red letters there was also the suggestive sentence in gold sheet letters "I am loaded with prunes from Dallas, Oregon. No better advertisement for this vicinity was ever sent out. As those cars roll along over between 2,000 and 3,000 miles, thousands of people will read that expression with no little interest and it will draw some of them to this very point. As a result of what has been seen and done in Dallas within the past week, more fruit will be planted, fruit hands will increase in price and finally this will become a great fruit shipping point. The car which left yesterday contained 941 crates, of which forty were furnished by Geo. Lowdell, 257 by M. M. Ellis and 644 by S. P. Kimball.
