HERE'S ANOTHER VICTIM

Of His Own Criminal

Nature.

Holmes Found Guilty of

Murder.

The Jury Quickly Unanimous, but

Delayed the Verdict for

Decency Sake.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 2.—Henry

H. Holmes was convicted of murder

in the first degree at 8:15 tonight for

killing Benjamin F. Pielzel. He

coughed slightly when he heard the

words. That was the only sign.

The jury retired to deliberate at 5:40 o'clock

this afternoon. According to one of

their number they reached their ver-
dict before the doors of their room

closed upon them. For hunger's sake

they ate their supper first. Then they

took a ballot and without hesitation

every man of the twelve answered:

"Guilty of murder in the first de-
gree."

But however atrocious the crime,

however heinous the criminal, it is

hard to send a man to the gallows in

one minute's time. So, for decency's

sake, they talked about the case

for a second period. About an hour and

a half. Then word was sent into court

that they had agreed. This was at

8:15. It took half an hour to get the

court in readiness to receive the ver-
dict.

Holmes spoke to his counsel, Rotan

and Shoemaker, in cell-room, because

he was taken back to Moyamensing

prison. To them he said:

"I feel that this condemnation me. It

was an unjust trial. He would say

no more than that. Immediately after

the verdict, the usual application for

leave to file a motion for a new trial

was made. Judge Arnold set the 18th

of this month for a hearing. The

principal reason urged will be the lack

of time for preparation for the defense.

Should a new trial be refused, an

appeal will be taken to the supreme

court as soon as everything goes

against him. Holmes has yet some

time to spend on earth.

The verdict was a surprise to many

persons who did not believe the case

had been fastened upon Holmes be-
cause of a reasonable doubt. When they

heard it they said:

"Well, it was on general principles,

and it is just as good."

It is not the meaning of the law,

but in this case everybody agrees that

it is just as good. There is no word

of pity or sympathy for the condemned

man.

In Gilmanston, N. H., his father and

mother and two brothers and two

sisters live. Not one of his kin was

heard from during the trial.

DURRANT'S NEXT TRIAL.

San Francisco, Nov. 2.—District At-

torney Harnes says that at the conclu-

sion of the preliminary examination of

the Durrant evidence it was decided

that the case should be tried in the

Williams case. In developing the for-

mer, however, new and stronger evi-

dence was added in connection with

the murder of Minnie Williams. The

evidence was so conclusive that the

case yet to be tried than the trial just

concluded. The most important of the

new witnesses is Alexander Zenger,

a cabinet-maker who is a member of

the church. He says that on the night

of April 12th, about 8:30 he walked

along Barrett street and when he

came to Emanuel church he saw Dur-

rant and Minnie Williams standing

outside of the church. The story is

contradicted by Durrant, who stated

that he did not see Minnie Wil-

liams at all on April 12th and had not

seen her for three weeks previous to

that day.

A PRINCELY GIFT.

John D. Rockefeller's Endowment to

Chicago University.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—The following let-

ter will explain itself:

"New York, October 30, 1895. To

the Trustees of the University of Chi-

cago: Gentlemen—I will contribute to

the University of Chicago one million

dollars for endowment, payable Janu-

ary 1, 1896, in cash or at my option

on approved interest-bearing securities

at their face market value. I will con-

tribute in addition to one million dol-

lars for endowment, or otherwise, as

I may designate payable in cash or at

my option in approved interest-bearing

securities at their face market value.

The sum in either case shall be paid

not only in matter equal to the con-

tributions of others in cash or equiva-

lent not hitherto promised, as the same

shall be received by the university. This

pledge shall be void as to any por-

tion of the sum herein promised

when it shall prove not to be payable

on the above terms, or on or before Jan-

uary 1, 1900. John D. Rockefeller."

RICH MAN KILLED.

a morning drive, attended by a hired

man, and at the crossing the buggy

was struck by a fast passenger train

on the Panhandle railroad. Hillard

was dead when picked up. The hired

man sustained serious injuries.
