FROM BEYOND THE OCEAN  
Germany Is Opposed to  
Women.  
No Reforms Apparent in  
Turkey.  
Horrible Discovery of a Diver—The  
Powers in a Quandary—  
Various Items.

BERLIN, Nov. 23.—Dr. Julius Boase,  
minister of education, has granted per-  
mission to sixty-seven American wom-  
en to attend the winter lectures of Ber-  
lin University. As a result, the Ger-  
man women, many of whom have been  
refused permission to attend those  
courses of instruction, have formally  
complained of this alleged favoritism.  
There is no doubt that German women  
will have the greatest obstacles thrown  
in their way. The professors of the  
German University are especially op-  
posed to women. One of the re-  
spected professors of German litera-  
ture recently requested the minister  
of education to prohibit the attend-  
ance of ladies at his lectures, and the  
historian, Fetscher, suddenly suspended  
his lecture on seeing a lady in the  
audience and led her out of the hall.  
Although 317 American students are  
entered at Berlin University for this  
winter.  
The stay of execution of sentence  
granted Louis Stern of New York in  
which to return to Klagenfurt to un-  
dergo his sentence of two years' im-  
prisonment and pay a fine of 200 marks,  
inflicted upon him for insulting a  
public official at that place has ex-  
pired and the court has declared that  
Stern's bail of 80,000 marks, \$24,000,  
is not sufficient to insure his return to  
Germany.  
AS MIGHT BE EXPECTED.  
London, Nov. 23.—The sudden fit of  
energy which convulsed the sultan of  
Turkey into doing something towards  
suppressing anarchy in Asia Minor,  
the result of the Marquis of Salisbury's  
Mansion House speech, seems to have  
spent its force and Abdul Hamid is  
said to have relapsed into his usual  
lethargic state. Reports of fresh mass  
sacrifices have reached here from many  
points of the disturbed empire and in  
brief, the Eastern question does not  
appear to be as near solution as it  
was held to be early part of the year.  
There has been little change in the  
nature of the problem before the powers  
however. Their mutual suspicions are  
acting as drag upon them and delay  
decided action upon their part, though  
the belief is still prevalent that nothing  
short of drastic measures will be  
sufficient to bring the sultan to terms for any  
length of time. This step, however,  
will not be adopted until all hope of  
the moral enforcement of reforms  
which Abdul Hamid solemnly prom-  
ised to adopt have vanished.  
A grim story is published today  
from Constantinople, according to  
which a diver, while recently engaged  
in assisting in the work of driving  
piles for a new pier at the Golden  
Horn, on reaching the sea bottom was  
surprised to find himself surrounded  
by the bodies of a number of men ap-  
parently standing upright around him.  
Upon investigation the diver discov-  
ered they were corpses of students who  
were recently arrested by the Turkish  
police and afterward taken out in  
boats and drowned in the Bosphorus.  
For taking part in the recent distur-  
bances at Istanbul. All the bodies  
had leaden weights attached to their  
feet, which kept them upright. The  
diver said there were from fifty to  
sixty bodies in that spot alone.  
The annual bicycle show is drawing  
larger crowds than ever before. For  
the first time several American bicycle  
firms are exhibiting this year. Critics  
say the American wheels are notable  
for their narrow handle bars and  
"slimpy" saddles and the claim is  
made that the trans-Atlantic machines  
are far too light to be durable.

THE NATION'S DRAIN  
GOLD GOING TO EUROPE AT AN  
ALARMING RATE.  
Better Close the Doors Against  
Egress Rather than Ingress  
of Inhabitants.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—Secretary  
Carlie in a circular letter sent to  
United States sub-treasurers this after-  
noon instructed that hereafter they re-  
ceive gold coin in sums of \$500, and  
multiples thereof and to pay express  
charges on gold and also on currency  
returned in exchange therefor. He al-  
so instructed sub-treasurers to receive  
light-weight gold coin and to ascer-  
tain the exact value of such coin and  
pay for it at face value less four cents  
for each Troy grain, if such coins are  
found to be below standard weight.  
This is believed to be the second time  
in the history of the government that  
it has paid express charges both on  
therefor. The only exception, it is  
said, was in 1853, when it was done  
in a few instances.  
THE OUTGO OF GOLD.  
New York, Nov. 23.—The salient  
features of the week has been the  
heavy outgo of gold, \$7,560,230 being  
sent to the heaviest shipment of any  
single week on record. This was all  
drawn from the treasury reserve. It  
is obvious that the dam built by the  
great syndicate bankers to protect the  
gold reserve has given way, because  
of the intense pressure for remittances  
and consequently the flood of gold  
pours forth. Secretary Carlie's after-  
dinner speech at the banquet of the  
chamber of commerce, advocating the  
restriction of exports, attracted con-  
siderable attention to that question. In  
the judgment of many experienced
