California's Production Will be Below

That of Last Year. Men interested in hops are saying the outlook for fair prices for the growing crop is growing brighter. The stocks on hand are becoming small, says the Statesman, even the very poorest grades being shipped away, and the present indications are for a smaller yield, at least 1 80 in this country, than last year. Now 29 92 the thing to do is to take care of the 56 50 growing crop, and see that a choice 18 quality is put into the bales after pick-

There are prospects of a short hop crop in California says the Telegram. A worm has served to keep back the growth of the vines by eating the sprouts as they appear above the ground, and unless the vines mature very rapidly, there will not be more than three

quarters of a full crop.

This information is the result of the observation of A, J. Ray, the well known agent of J. M. Russel & Co., who has just returned from a visit to the hop districts of California. "According to the most reliable esti-mates at hand," said Mr. Ray, "the 1900

4 45 mates at hand, said sir. Ray, the 1900 13 50 crop will reach 47,000 bales. Last year's 94 50 crop aggregated 56,000 bales, of which there are still 500 bales unmoved in the hands of the growers. Contracts have been made for 6000 bales of the new crop at from 9 to 10 cents.

Too much warm rains would dampen the vines and breed hop vermin, which will greatly reduce the output of choice bops. Generally speaking, however, the world's crop is bound to be short. Under the most favorable conditions possible, the yield cannot reach the total outout of last year. And the fact that only a fraction of last year's crop remains unsold gives assurance that the prices will make 1900 the banner year.
