The question, Will China be Diided? Is the issue which the war in that country brings to the front. In a large degree the answer to this query lies with our nation. The report that the United States has been asked to join with the European powers in the partition, and to signify what part of China it would ask as its own portion, is probably not correct. There is not the slightest doubt, however, that the only thing which stands in the way of China's partition at the present moment is the consent of the United States. It is easy to see that the Chinese government is dexterously playing into the hands of the enenies of its country.
