Ordinance No. 59.

An ordinance to prevent chickens and other domestic fowls from running at large within the City of Independence. The people of the City of Independence do hereby enact as follows:

Sec. 1.—It shall be unlawful during the months of May, June, July, August, September and October, each year, for any person owning or keeping chickens, or other domestic fowls, within the City of Independence, to allow them to run at large.

Sec. 2.—Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten (10) dollars, nor less than one (1) dollar, in addition to costs. Passed City Council June 4, 1901. Attest: CLARENCE R. WAGONER, City Recorder.
