A Tribute From Monmouth

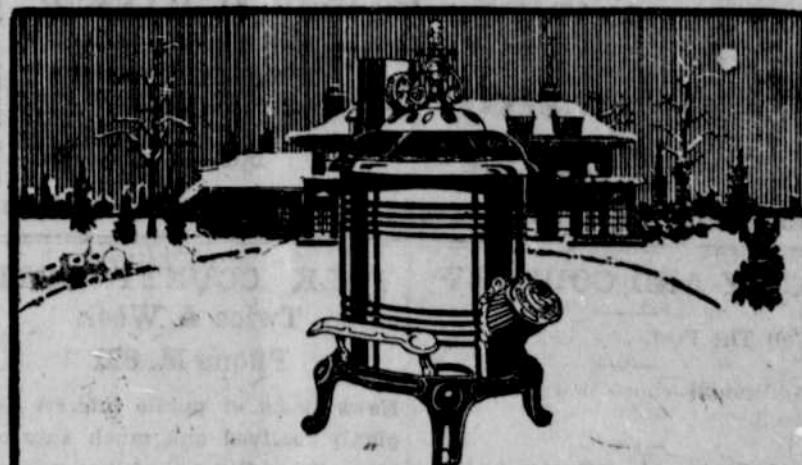

10. Don't use a napkin, towel, spoon, fork, glass or cup which has been used by another person and not washed.
