TO ADVERTISE VICTORY LOAN

Each Pacific Coast State to Get at Least One Tank to Aid Fifth Drive

Twelve tanks which have been assigned to the Twelfth Federal Reserve District for use during the Victory Liberty Loan drive opening April 21 have been assigned to the seven states in the district so that each state in the district will get at least one of the tanks to display during the campaign. The tanks have been assigned as follows: Two to Washington, one to Oregon, one to Idaho, one to Utah, one to Nevada, two to Northern California and two to Southern California and Arizona. The remaining two tanks are to be carried on special trophy trains which will tour the district.

Tanks in Sham Battle

Veterans of the American Expeditionary Forces who have seen actual service in France will be the drivers of the tanks during the campaign. Before being distributed throughout the district for the opening of the campaign the tanks will parade in San Francisco and give a sham battle.

All of the tanks are being shipped from the East direct to San Francisco. They are due to arrive there about April 6 when they will be taken to a four acre tract near the Southern Pacific freight yards and assembled by the men who are to drive them. Each of the tanks will be armed with a Marlin machine gun or 37 M.M. smoke bombs with special pistols and lights.

Display of War Relics

In addition to the tanks the special trophy trains will carry a complete display of relics which have been gathered on the battlefields of France and which have been shipped back to this country since the signing of the armistice. Accompanying each of the trains will be an American war hero who will speak for the Victory Loan. One of the trains will tour the Northwest and the other will travel through California and the Southwest.
