There is nothing commonplace about "The Secret Garden," the bill for Wednesday night. It is a beautiful story, told with distinction, and played by an excellent company with little Miss Lila easily carrying off the honors. The appeal of the story is tremendous, and its moral value is brought out to the full. But the story always takes precedence over the lesson, the picture is never preachy. It is entertaining thruout and is enlivened with charming touches of comedy. "Overboard with sorrow, then! Give Dull Care the slip by journeying with Lila on her five reel trip." The supplement of the evening is James Montgomery Flagg's satirical comedy, "One Every Minute." The title has reference to "suckers." A chap thought as a movie star he could outshine Doug Fairbanks, and it cost him \$25,000 to "break in."

The theater is dark on Thursday night.

Friday night it is Elsie Ferguson in "Under the Greenwood Tree" and Fatty Arbuckle in "Out West." Any picture in which the beautiful and talented Elsie Ferguson stars in is sure to be good. Miss Ferguson's charming portrayal of the role of a jaded English society girl who longs

for the simple life and involves herself trouble thereby, is one of the best with which her name has been associated since her entrance into the silent drama. In "Out West" Fatty tames every bad man he meets but meeting a Salvation Army girl he turns reformer and "dians up" morally the town of "Mad Dog." He is also assisted by the colored lad, known as "Snowball."

Bessie Barrisicle appears in "All of a Sudden Norma" Saturday night. This production gives a chance to do some of the cleverest things she has ever done and to look prettier than she has ever looked. It's full of snap—every part of the five reels moves fast. Bessie does things every minute from the opening to the close. Any play in which there are not many things doing is no play for Bessie. Going along at the high speed, you will pass "You Can't Judge the Girl by the Game She Plays," "Paste Diamonds Worth a King's Ransom," "The Pajama Girl and the Poor Duke," "How to Be Free Tho Married," "One Way to Handle a Husband," "How to Get Rich in a Hurry," "A Love Story That Ends in Love," "The Way of a Woman with a Man" and "She Walked in Her Sleep in His Bedroom."

The German spy menace in this country is ably exposed in "The Hun Within" the attraction for Sunday night. It is in no sense inferior in interest to other famous war pictures. The story deals with Hun plots on the Atlantic seaboard, and proves that all German-Americans are not traitors to the country of their adoption. Dorothy Gish plays the part of a patriotic American girl whose love affair is interrupted by Hun spies who seek to destroy American transports bound for France with troops. She foils this plot in an ingenious way, but not until after she has had gruelling experiences, all of which are calculated to keep the attention of the audience at high tension. The activities of the U. S. Secret Service operatives in dealing with the Hun spy menace are graphically shown in this photoplay.
