### NEXT WEEK AT THE ISIS

Someone has said there is only a hairline between poverty and wealth, vice and virtue, joy and sadness. This seems to be true in the experiences of Henry Warner and Ruth Orton in "Kiss or Kill," the Monday night attraction. Henry Warner, a veteran of the World War, who had been wounded in France and discharged, comes back to New York to look for work, but fails to find it. Then, one night, the temptation to become a thief overcomes him. That is the way "Kiss or Kill" starts. Ruth Orton, a girl who has struggled hard to keep her head above the surface of the sea of immorality, in the face of poverty, finds herself yielding to the plea of a man of wealth that she wed him. Craig at first was only a pleasure loving young man without vicious tendencies. Then, one day, he saw a paper that proved a beautiful girl to be the heiress to the property his uncle administers. This knowledge changes him instantly into a grasping, scheming adventurer who determines to wed the girl in order to get control of her fortune. Thus, in the cases of all three persons, there seemed only a hairline between the kind of humans they should have remained and the kind they were changed into when money and poverty became dominant factors in their lives.

On Tuesday night, Harry Carey, the cowboy actor, makes his first appearance on the screen in Independence. Many were so generous in their praise of Carey that the Isis proprietors "booked" him up. He is a real honest-to-goodness cowpuncher and bronco buster; born and reared on a ranch, knows his West from mountain to coast and gulf to border, and shoots, rides and ropes like a whirlwind. Among the many humorous features of "Roped" is the spectacle of a bunch of cowboys trying to take care of a bouncing baby. The thumb-nail theme is that Cheyenne Harry goes East to see a girl who has answered a matrimonial advertisement written without his knowledge by his cowboys. He finds the girl, marries her and becomes a proud father. Then her mother, striving for social power, tries to wreck their home by backing a lounge lizard in his suit. Harry cleans house of the lizard and his mother-in-law as well, and starts for the Grand Canon on his honeymoon.

On Wednesday night, Enid Bennett plays the part of the young and beautiful Agnes Cuyler who is a cabaret dancer in New York, a life against which her better nature revolts, and to escape she accepts the marriage offer of a Westerner. The man, however, proves to be a drunkard and coward. Because she takes from him his whiskey, he pushes her from his auto on the desert. Lost on the ocean of sand, she is found almost exhausted by Hassayampa Hardy, a desert rat, who takes her to his dugout and hears her story. He secures her a job as a waitress, where she meets Arthur Gould, who, threatened with consumption, has

come to Arizona on advice of a physician but has landed broke and hungry. She feeds him and when he becomes ill, gives him shelter in her home. Uncharitable women try to attribute wrong motives and she is about to be driven from the town when Hardy arrives for provisions. Then the "Partners Three" go out into the desert. Cuyler follows, discovers that Hardy has found gold, steals the location notice, and, after draining Hardy's water barrels, forces his wife to return to town with him. Then the climax follows bringing good luck to the "Partners Three." The Mack Sennett comedy for the same evening bears the title of "Reilly's Wash Day." The "hero" is a plumber so lazy that he has a dog on a tread mill do all of his work that his wife can't find to do.

On Thursday night there is a good Fox special and a Sunshine comedy. On Friday night, the sweetest and most popular stage actress of America, Billie Burke, appears in "Good Gracious, Annabelle!" She is so chic, dainty and petite that everybody loves her. The theme of the picture is one of exceptional excellence and it provides Miss Burke with one of the most delightful characterizations of her screen career. The story deals with a hermit miner in a Western mining town who, in a pitched battle between miners, kidnaps a girl and carries her to his cave. In order that her reputation might not suffer, he calls in a parson and marries her out of hand. When she protests, he thrusts her out of the cave and tells her to shift for herself, and she quits him without even knowing his name. Later, when the miner strikes it rich, he provides liberally for his wife who is living in an Eastern city. How the two are ultimately reunited is captivatingly shown in a series of splendid scenes, filled with thrills, dramatic interest, suspense and refined comedy.
