The sale of Christmas Seals opened last Monday. The campaign was planned and ready to launch Dec. 10 but the weather man changed the plans. Five dollars' worth of the stick ers were left at the Beaver Hotel and in an hour they were all sold. The gay little seals can be purchased at Craven & Walker's. These seals need no introduction. They have been with us for twelve years. The sale of the Christmas seals is the principal means by which the fight against tuberculosis is waged. Ninety per cent of the proceeds from the state sale is turned over to the Oregon Tuberculosis Association and it is expended in Oregon to prevent and to cure the disease. The remaining 10 per cent pays for the seals, posters and part of the administrative expense. Let no Christmas parcel or Christmas letter leave Independence without one of these Christmas seals. The field secretary, Mr. Dorris, supplied the committee here with \$100 worth of seals, so there will be enough for everybody.
