MANJAK BETTER THAN PAINT

Value as a Preservative of Metals.

Manjak is rapidly coming into use in the Trindad oil fields as a preservative of metals because of its toughness, its excellent insulating property, its resistance to heat and ts imperviousness to water and air.

Manjak is an almost pure bitumen, much like asphalt in its chemical composition, but while asphalt melts at 100 degrees Fahrenheit, manjak needs more than 400 degrees Fahrenheit to melt it. It is 80 to 90 per cent carbon, the rest being hydrogen and a small quantity of sulphur. It looks like coal, is odorless, hard, brittle and easily separated in its long, pencil-shaped grain. When melted and applied in a liquid state it hardens to an almost unbreakable rubberlike coating. It is used for painting pipe lines, boilers, chimneys, sprocket wheels, pinions and other ironware and machinery. It s especially efficacious on the joints of the pipes used in drilling for oil, on car trucks, fenders, iron cans which are submerged in brine, also

on the roofs of cars. There are large deposits of manak near the great asphalt lake in Trinidad, also some in Utah, Cuba and Barbados.
