Serious floods continue in northern and southern Japan. There have been many casualties. Crops and roads have been ruined. Twenty thousand persons are urgently in need of aid.

A Pennlylvania railroad electric train struck an antomobile bus containing 15 persons at Camden, N. J., Saturday night. Eight occupants were killed and four others injured.

Captain W. W. Gilmer, recently relieved as governor of the island of Guam, announced upon his arrival in San Francisco that he intends to resign his commission in the navy.

Lonsea, 75 miles northwest of Warsaw, and Bialystok, 50 miles east of Lomza, have been recaptured by the Polish armies, said an official war office communication Wednesday.

The situation created by the withdrawal of the Russian forces operat ing in northern Poland now permits of the resumption of the distribution by the Red Cross of American supplies from Danzig to Warsaw by railway.

Exports during July were \$23,000, 000 greater than in June, while imports decreased \$16,000,000. Trade figures made public by the department of commerce place the value of July exports at \$654,000,000 and imports at \$537,000,000.
