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
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Chautauqua Presents the Valda Four

ALLOWED TO TAG OYSTERS

United States Patent Office Hands Down Decision in Case of Infringement Claim.

The United States patent office, only the other day, decided a dispute concerning the validity of a patent which had been granted for an oyster tag.

The idea involved was that of identifying oysters by fastening a metal tag to the under shell of each



one, indicating the source from which they came. When served on the half-shell, they would carry a sort of guarantee with them. The owners of the patent sued a

rival concern which ventured to tag its own oysters. Infringement was claimed. But the patent office decided that the complaint was without merit, inasmuch as a tagged oyster was not a manufactured product, nor an invention in any proper sense. It declared that exclusive rights in a tagged spring chicken might as reasonably be claimed; and, accordingly, the patent was pronounced void .--- Philadelphia Ledger.
