HOTEL FOR HORSES.

In that section of Berlin known as Charlottenberg there is a veritable hotel for horses. This hotel—if we may be permitted to call even a de luxe stable a hotel—provides luxurious quarters for the horses of a Berlin bus company, as well as rents rooms by the day, week or year for horses visiting or staying permanently in the city. The structure, which is of brick, is three stories high. On each floor there is a roomy balcony running the full length of the building and available for exercising the horses.
