NATIONAL GUARD TO PRACTICE

Arrangements have been completed for sending the Oregon National Guard which includes Company K of Independence, to field camp June 15 for intensive training.

The announcement concerning the same is as follows:

Three special trains will be used out of Portland, the first one taking the heavy artillery to the mouth of the Columbia river forts. The other two specials will run direct to the place assigned Oregon's citizen soldiers in Camp Lewis. Units from coast points, southern Oregon and the Willamette valley will begin the trip June 14 so as to arrive in Portland to board the special trains. Cities to be represented are: Marshfield, Newport, Toledo, Salem, Albany, Eugene, Roseburg, Medford, Ashland and Portland. About 500 men will go from Portland.

Practical training on their duties as national defenders will be given the Oregon national guardsmen. At the Columbia river forts the Oregon men will take complete possession of the big coast batteries and perfect themselves in the work of repelling invasion. The field artillery and engineers will be attached to regular army groups at Camp Lewis. The Oregon infantry regiment, the 5th Oregon, will spend half of the training period in battle rifle practice on

the Camp Lewis rifle ranges, and will engage in battle maneuvers.

As the result of co-operation by employers of guardsmen throughout the state, attendance this year will be larger than of any previous year, according to attendance estimates received by Adjutant-General White. No unit will go with fewer than 50 men. While several organizations will have 100 men at camp. A large silver cup is to be given to the organization having the highest percentage of its total strength at camp.

Following the field camp and return home of the men there will be another assembly at Clackamas, Or., of selected rifle experts who will take part in the state rifle competition for 1921.
