IDENTIFICATION MARKS.

An important adjunct to crime detection is reported from Paris. This new plan supplements the Bertillon system of measurements and fingerprints. It has been found that a man can be traced not by fingerprints alone but by marks on any part of the body. Any of the pores of the skin may be employed. This is the discovery of Doctor Locard, head of the French police school at Lyons. Criminals often use gloves to foil detectives, but the forearm or the elbow may give a print equally as valuable for identification.
