Rickreall Jersey Herd Make Splendid Record

Breaking its own record for the production of butterfat made in May, a herd of 15 Jerseys owned by McArthur & Stauff of Rickreall set a new world mark for the Jersey breed in July with an average of 61.37 pounds of butterfat for each animal during the month, according to a report of the American Jersey Cattle Club. The record made by the same herd in May was an average of 60.68 pounds of fat for each animal.

With the average production of 59.48 pounds of fat for June, slightly less than the other two months because June has only 30 days, the three months average of 60.50 pounds of fat for each animal a month not only breaks the Jersey record for that period for a herd of 14 or more cows, but sets a world's record for all breeds.

Ten cows in the herd, all daughters of the sire Holger, averaged 68 pounds of butterfat a month during the three months period. This record is said to be unequalled by any other group of 10 daughters of one bull. Holger was a full brother of Rinda Lad of S. B., the grand-sire of St. Mawes' Lad's Lady who last week broke the record for all breeds as a senior yearling.

The McArthur and Stauff herd

has been built in less than 10 years by O. B. Stauff, partner in the business with Congressman Pat McArthur.

IDEAL FOR SLIPPERY ROADS

At Last Here Is a Motor Car That Can Not Skid, Under Any Circumstances.

A true nonskidding motor car, described with illustrations in the Popular Mechanics Magazine, has been evolved by a Czechoslovakian inventor in which the driving members are feet and legs instead of wheels, and which propels itself by a heel-and-toe walking action. The four legs of the odd contrivance are attached to the throws of a crank-shaft in such a way that as it revolves they are first lifted, then carried forward and lowered, and again carried backward. Another part causes them to rock backward at the top as they descend, which brings the heel of the foot in contact with the ground first. As the shaft continues to turn, the heel gives a backward shoving impulse and rises. The toe then comes into contact and imparts a shove. The throws of the crankshaft are so spaced that the eight heels and toes follow each other with their impulses in rapid succession and at exactly equal intervals.

FEEDING EXPERIMENTS.

It seems that the processes which have been developed and described for manufacturing cattle food from sawdust, in which a part of the cellulose is converted into sugars, have been based more upon laboratory experiments and theoretical deductions than actual feeding experiments. The forest products laboratory prepared a sufficient quantity of the food to supply three cows for a sufficient time to indicate the desirability of conducting experiments on a larger scale. The Wisconsin experiment station co-operated in this work, and the results were so encouraging that it has been decided to feed a larger number of animals a sufficient length of time to reach definite conclusions.

MEN CRITICIZED.

Every woman knows that men, "though interesting creatures, are tiresome, hard to control and are prone to seek their own way in spite of warnings," according to Mrs. H. A. L. Fisher, wife of the president of the British national board of education. She told an audience at the Royal Sanitary institute congress that most men become ill entirely through faults of their own and "sow seeds of trouble for themselves by eating too much, eating the wrong things, drinking too much, being lazy, keeping late hours or living in hermetically sealed rooms."
