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MAY BAR FOREIGN CLOTHES

Turkish Assembly Considering Strenuous Measures for Encouragement of Home Factories.

A bill compelling members of parliament, civil servants, teachers and town councillors to wear only clothing manufactured in Turkey is being hotly debated by the Turkish national assembly at Angora, according to the London Mail's Constantinople correspondent.

One provision is that every person now possessing a shirt, necktie or any other articles of clothing manufactured abroad shall register each article, in which case he will be allowed to wear it out.

During the debate one deputy, who urged that the bill should become law, so as to get rid of fashion's tyranny, was heckled with the question, "Why wear ties?"

Immediately he took off and tore up his tie, whereupon the assembly cheered him and cried, "Long live native manufacturers!"

Despite Turkey's quite rudimentary factories, parliament is tending to pass the bill.

STUDYING ESKIMO RACE.

Eskimo skeletons to the number of 30 have arrived in Halifax from the Far North for examination and measurement on behalf of the Canadian government by Dr. John Cameron, professor of anatomy at Dalhousie university. The skeletons have been brought from the land of snows by the Canadian arctic exploration party which has spent five years in Canada's frigid zone study-

ing the customs, languages and characteristics of the Eskimo race. They were found in the region north of the Mackenzie river. Doctor Cameron estimates that upward of three years will be required to complete the study of the skeletons and make the thousands of measurements necessary.

NEW WAY OF MAKING MONEY

Inventive Berlin Trickster Makes Big Profits in Dealings With "Post Office Pens."

One way of making money: Penholders are no longer to be found on post office tables in Berlin, but may be obtained from a window-framed official, on the deposit of a mark. One enterprising German buys himself a number of penholders at 50 pfennig apiece and sets to work writing at the desk of some busy branch post office, the Kansas City Times states. When he shows symptoms of being through with his pen some eager person is sure to ask him whether he will pass it on. "Yes," is the answer, "just give me the mark which I laid out for se-

curity, and you may have it. You will get the mark back when you return the pen to the window."

The transaction is accomplished; when the unsuspecting borrower returns the pen to the official it is looked on coldly and declined: "No such pen was taken from this window. It doesn't belong here." And the enterprising trickster has departed to duplicate the trick in another post office branch. It's a small way to make money, but he makes 100 per cent on his investment.
