In order to keep fit for his work Phyehey can permit himself to smoke only a very little, and he dares not drink anything else for fear of dulling his tasting ability.

"A very considerable quantity of poor wine is being shipped into this country at present," Phyehey said, "and new tricks are being invented every day to evade the correct tax; so it is most necessary that I keep my palate fit for tasting, my eyes keen for color and condition and my nose clear for vinegar smell. Perhaps that is why I hate tasting and have hated it all my life."

FRENCH MARRIAGES DOUBLE

Birth Rate Shows Gain Over 1918—Deaths Decrease Say Official Figures.

Paris.—The number of marriages in France has doubled, the number of births increased, while fewer deaths are registered in 1920 than in 1919, the last full year of peace. This is shown by the official figures just published by the ministry of labor. The excess birth over deaths in 1920, was 159,700, as compared to 66,914 in 1919. The marriages totaled 625,000 in 1920, against 312,000 in 1919.

The significance of these figures is increased when it is remembered that the total population of France has decreased as a result of the war.

Tiger and "Tricks" His Assets. New York.—One tiger valued at \$500 and a box of tricks worth the same amount are listed among the assets of Horace Goldin, theatrical magician, in a bankruptcy petition filed in the United States court here. Mr. Goldin said the tiger and the tricks had helped him accumulate debts of \$37,775 in the last two years.

Man's Span of Life Increased Four Years

Columbus, O.—The span of man's life has lengthened fully four years within the last quarter century, in spite of the hazards which have come with Twentieth century progress.

So declares Dr. George W. Hoglan, secretary of the American Insurance union, who adds that "within another generation the allotted threescore years and ten will be a thing of the past."
