FISH IS NOT POPULAR FOOD

With the Wonderful Supply at Their Command, People of the United States Eat Little.

Americans have been noted for the lavish and often reckless manner in which they have used the national resources but, strangely, the vast resources of our seas and lakes have not been used as the other nations of the world use theirs. The people of the United Kingdom eat about sixty-five pounds of fish each, each year; Sweden, 52 pounds; Norway, 44 pounds; Canada, 30 pounds, and the United States, 16 pounds. Our comparatively insignificant consumption is due to sluggish demand and not to scarcity of fish. The seas adjacent to our shores are vast reservoirs of food produced without effort on the part of man, and our Great Lakes hold unsurpassed stores of fresh-water fishes. We have at our command a greater variety of fine food fishes and shellfishes than any other country, but we do not use them as we must eventually, for in the future we must draw an ever-increasing supply of our food from the waters as the land becomes less able to supply the needs of the increasing population.

AIR CONSERVES BOARD FLOOR

Free Circulation Underneath Prolongs Life of Lumber—Close Openings During Winter.

Board floors usually are short-lived unless air is allowed to circulate under them. This may be provided for by means of openings in the foundation walls, which should be closed during the winter. A board floor covered with one-quarter inch of fine sand, with scratching material on this makes a good floor. The litter and sand can be removed readily when desired, and fresh materials provided. If the wooden floors are constructed within two or three inches of the ground it is essential that the foundation walls be constructed in such a way that rats cannot gain access beneath the floor.

FOWLS REQUIRE GREEN FEED

More Important During Summer Months Than in Winter—Give Them Clover and Weeds.

Remember that yarded fowls need greens and vegetable food during the summer months even more than in winter. If their yards are bare, add cut clover to the daily mash, and throw to the birds all the weeds that you pull in the garden as well as lawn clippings, etc.

Nature in Freakish Mood.

A reader at Grand Falls, Newfoundland, says that a lobster was caught in Newfoundland waters with a curious front left claw. It was a perfect form of a man's head and face. The eyes, nose and mouth were very distinct; also the curling waves of hair and a small pointed beard. If viewed from a different angle the claw presents the features of a laughing girl.
