BRAIN MATERIAL TO SPARE

Apparently Nature Has Provided Mankind With More Thinking Material Than Is Required.

The World war gave unprecedented opportunities for the study of injuries to the brain.

There were instances in which individual fighting men lost as much as a teaspoonful of brain substance without impairment of their mental faculties. Extraordinary!

The reason is not easy of explanation. But apparently nature provides us with more brain material than we need to think with, and we can spare quite a bit of it without serious consequences, unless some essential structure be entirely destroyed.

One thing the brain will not endure is compression. In childhood the skull may be squeezed all out of shape without harmful result. The Flathead Indians do that, and so do aboriginal peoples in other parts of the world. But even a clot of blood, due to cerebral hemorrhage, is liable to cause paralysis, and local pressure of a bone may render a person insane.—Philadelphia Ledger.

ELECTRIC MOTOR CAR WATCH

Engine of Minute Size, invention of Frenchman, is Said to Give Perfect Satisfaction.

An electric motor, reduced to such a minute size that it can be used to operate the works of a watch of normal shape, is a recent French invention, described in Popular Mechanics Magazine. Besides the motor, the watch contains a battery, equally minute, to furnish the necessary current. This is a liquid battery in a water-tight case, with partitions, all of an indestructible material. The motor is only about three-eighths inch in diameter and is composed of two concentric fields, with an armature mounted between them, all serrated. Its commutator is in the form of a small cavity which retains in it, by capillary attraction, one drop of mercury. What would correspond to the brush of the commutator is a thin metallic pin that moves in and out of this drop of mercury. There is, of course, no daily rewinding, and the only thing that ever requires attention is the battery, which, it is claimed, would have to be renewed only once a year.
