CONSTANTINOPLE IN
STATE OF PANIC

Crime Almost Unchecked; Out-
break by Moslem Fanatics
is Feared.

Constantinople.—The porte has ap-
plied to the powers for mediation with
a view to the cessation of hostilities,
and for the negotiation of peace. Ap-
plication has been made to the emba-
sies here and by circular to the Otto-
man representatives in the European
capitals.

Constantinople is in a fever of ex-
citement over the alarming reports
from the field of battle.

Foreigners and natives are suffer-
ing from tension caused by the series
of military disasters, and, although
the city is in a state of siege, crime
in some quarters is unchecked.

Many families are leaving the city.
The people fear first an outbreak of
Moslem fanaticism by the turbulent
elements of the lower classes, and sec-
ondly, a rising in hordes of maddened
soldiers who are being driven by the
Bulgarians to make their last stand a
few miles outside of Constantinople
and then perhaps to fall back on the
capital.

London.—In the note to Turkish am-
bassadors abroad, the Turkish govern-
ment maintains that although embar-
rassing, affairs are not desperate and
when the allies had completed mobil-
ization Turkey had barely begun hers.
Up to the present hour there is no
sign that anything has come to the
Porte's appeal to the powers.

No replies have been received at
Constantinople and there is little
doubt that when they are received
they will embody a declaration to con-
sider the idea of proposing an armis-
tice.

A Constantinople dispatch to the
Chronicle, which was received by an
indirect route, says that the situation
in the Turkish capital is grave. The
hostility to Europeans is increasing
and displayed arrogantly.

Some of the workmen's guilds, the
dispatch says, boast that they have
taken a sacred vow to massacre every
Christian should the Bulgarians enter
the city. Fanatics have sworn a ter-
rible vengeance on the infidels for
Turkish defeat, while in obscure
mosques theological students preach
incitements to the mob.

SCHOONER WRECKED; 5 LOST

Aviator Tries to Rescue Members of
Ill-Fated Crew

Marshfield, Or.—Five lives were lost
on the Coos Bay bar when the little
gasoline schooner Osprey was wrecked
and when her captain, refusing to be
the only one of the crew saved, leaped
to death on the jetty rocks.

Heroic attempts were made to save
the men by the tug Roscoe, but with-
out result. The lifesavers were out,
but were unable to do anything, as
the sea was rolling high, and an air-
ship flight was made twice over the
bar by Aviator Christofferson, of
Portland, in the hope of locating some
of the men, but they had met death
so quickly and the waves of the bar
had so rapidly accomplished their
work of destruction that there was no
chance to do anything when the news
of the disaster reached this city.

The list of the dead follows: Cap-
tain Gus Johnson, of Wedderburn,
master of the Osprey; Chester John-
son, of Coquille, engineer of the Os-
prey; Joe Peitsch, of Aberdeen, sea-
man on the Osprey; Captain H. Jacob-
son, formerly master of the wrecked
Berwick, passenger; Indian Ned Har-
vey, of Wedderburn, passenger.

SHERMAN'S BODY
IS LAID IN CRYPT

Utica, N. Y.—With simple but im-
pressive ceremonies the body of Vice
President Sherman was laid away
Saturday afternoon in a crypt within
a beautiful mausoleum in Forest Hill
Cemetery.

Under a canvas covering that serv-
ed as a shield against a chill Novem-
ber wind were gathered the Sherman
family, President Taft, members of
his cabinet, justices of the supreme
court, senators and members of the
house of representatives and a few
intimate friends and business asso-
ciates of the vice president.

President Taft listened with bowed
head and tear-dimmed eyes as Dr. M.
W. Stryker, president of Hamilton
college, read the brief committal serv-
ice and Rev. Louis H. Holden, pastor
of Christ church, of which Mr. Sher-
man was a member, offered prayer.

A mixed chorus sang "Good Night"
and when a selection by the male
chorus had been finished the president
gazed a moment at the flower-covered
casket and slowly made his way to a
waiting automobile, accompanied by
ex-Vice President Fairbanks, Atter-
ney General Wickersham and Mark
Rhoades, his military aide.

Police Force On Strike.

Lethbridge, Alberta.—The entire po-
lice force of Lethbridge has resigned
on the eve of dry farming congress
week. The members of the force pro-
tested against the appointment of Con-
stable Skelton, of Toronto, as inspec-
tor in preference to a local man, and
threatened resignations unless the ap-
pointment was rescinded. The May-
or refused to accept the resignations,
declaring the Council was not to be
dictated to.

15,000 PAY HOMAGE
TO DEAD "NEWSBOY"

Chicago.—A funeral such as was
never known before was accorded
"Billy" Hugh, "newsboy" who gave his
life that a girl might live. Greater hom-
age in pageantry and grandeur has
been paid kings and statesmen be-
loved by nations but this was a sponta-
neous tribute from the hearts of men
and women in honor of a hero.

Fifteen thousand persons, singing
"Nearer, My God to Thee," crowded

about his casket on a street corner in
Gary, Ind. By their very numbers
they had blocked a mile long funeral
cortege and prevented the holding of
a church service.

Strong men of many races, workers
in steel mills that were closed in
Hugh's honor, wept as they formed in
slowly past the coffin of the dead
"newsboy." Their wives and children
were with them and many stretched
forth their hands in an effort to ex-
press their reverence by offering
money for the erection of a monument.

Among those who passed slowly by
were Charles Smith and his two sons.
It was Ethel Smith, his 19-year-old
daughter, whose life was saved by
Hugh's self-sacrifice in permitting am-
putation of a crippled leg from which
skin was grafted. Miss Smith was
badly burned and skin grafting was
necessary to save her life. She was
unable to leave her bed.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Ralph Henry of Newport shot and
killed a man named Dodds at Cor-
vallis. Dodds is said to have alien-
ated the affections of Henry's wife.

A bequest of \$10,000 for the Bible
University of the Christian church at
Eugene was left in the will of the late
Thomas W. Phillips, of Newcastle, Pa.

John Kilcourse, aged 73, a veteran
of the Boer war and a British pension-
er, was killed just at the outskirts of
Eugene by being hit by a switch en-
gine.

The importance of the growing of
cover crops in orchards is emphasized
in a recent bulletin on orchard irri-
gation issued by the Oregon Agricul-
tural college.

Governor West designated Lieuten-
ant Colonel B. K. Lawson of Cottage
Grove to go to Klamath Falls and
make an investigation of conditions
which were said to exist there.

Ethel Davidson of Medford, 15 years
of age, is the latest eligible for a Car-
negie medal. She plunged into the
cold waters of the Rogue and saved
her aged father from drowning.

In a report of the Oregon Short Line
the operating revenues are shown to
be \$20,695,538, and operating expenses
are \$10,340,612, or an operating in-
come of \$9,161,136, after deductions.

That the only qualification a woman
has to vote in a school election is the
ownership of property in her own name
is the substance of an opinion handed
down by Assistant Attorney-General
De Long.

Complying with a request made
upon him by Governor West, A. W.
Brown, of Portland, recently appoint-
ed by the governor as a member of
the state board of pharmacy, has for-
warded to him his resignation.

John Hawkins Simmons, a promi-
nent pioneer of Marion county, died at
his home in Woodburn on November
1, after a short illness. He was born
in Fort Wayne, Indiana, in 1832 and
crossed the plains by ox team in 1847.

For approximately \$400,000, a tract
of yellow pine timber in Lake county,
comprising 20,000 acres, has been pur-
chased by the Schroeder lumber com-
pany of Milwaukee, Wis., and the
Oregon Land & Livestock company
of Eugene.

Those who paid for space in the
voters' pamphlet containing the initia-
tive and referendum measures, will
receive a refund of \$25 a page, as the
cost of the pamphlet was this much
below the amount estimated by the
secretary of state.

Operating revenues of the Southern
Pacific for the entire line totaled \$30,
621,090 for the year ending June 30,
according to a partial report for that
company just filed with the state rail-
road commission. The total intra-
state revenues for the state of Oregon
were \$7,993,718.

Tracklaying operations on the Ore-
gon Eastern railway, the new Harri-
man trans-Oregon line now being
built west from Vale, which were
stopped two weeks ago on account of
the shortage of motive power will be
resumed within 30 or 40 days, says
an official report received.

The body of an unidentified man,
the right hand still clasping a 38 cal-
ibre Smith & Wesson revolver and
with a gaping wound in the right tem-
ple, was found in an empty house on
the old Geiger donation land claim,
a mile and a half south of Cornelius.
The man was about 43 years old and
weighed 200 pounds.

An agreement expected to result in
the annual exporting from Portland of
\$1,000,000 worth of pure bred live-
stock to the new Chinese republic was
reached at Portland by En Lung
Heieh, for the new republic, O. M.
Plummer for the Portland Union
Stockyards company, and O. M. Clark,
trustee of the chamber of commerce.

Death has claimed its third victim
from the boiler explosion in the Salem
Bank & Trust building of last Tues-
day. I. B. Muchmore died Saturday
as the result of injuries in the cata-
strophe. W. G. East, cashier of the
bank, and Harry Ahlers, son of the
president of the bank, were the first
victims, Mr. East dying early Wed-
nesday and Ahlers later in the day.

In a letter addressed to the state
land board, Governor West has formal-
ly stated his intention of assigning
H. M. Esterly, now special prosecutor
in the governor's vice crusade in Port-
land, to the task of regaining for Ore-
gon 50,000 acres or more of land al-
leged to have been fraudulently se-
cured from the state in the famous
Benson and Hyde operations. As soon
as it can be arranged, Attorney Ester-
ly will be relieved of his special work
in Portland, which will be placed in
other hands.

BIG BOND ISSUES DEFEATED

Electric Franchise is Victorious; both
Charters are Defeated

Portland.—An unexpectedly large
vote cast Saturday at the special city
election, resulted in the defeat of both
forms of commission charter, all of
the bond issues proposed, including
the public markets measure; salary
increases sought; left the police under
civil service by a large majority and
carried down with the general vote
the proposition to create the
office of city prosecutor.

The one outstanding favorable vote
was that for the Northwestern Elec-
tric company, which was granted a
franchise to sell light, heat and power
in Portland by an overwhelming ma-
jority.

According to practically complete
returns the voting public turned out to
the extent of not less than 50 per
cent.

Boy Drops Gun, is Killed
The Dalles.—Wilson Kinnersly, aged
15, was instantly killed by the dis-
charge of a shotgun. With two com-
panions, Kinnersly was returning from
hunting, and about a mile from town
stepped into a boat on the slough to
row home. In entering the boat he
dropped the gun, when both charges
exploded and entered the boy's chest.
