LEAVE ALONE BOOK AGENTS

Every man who can afford it should buy, own and read good books.

Many more could and would own good books if the sale of books was properly managed.

The difficulty is with the vicious, extravagant, often dishonest system of "book agents."

Against these agents as individuals, there is nothing need be said.

They work hard to make a living; their task is unpleasant and their profit small.

The trouble is with those that handle the book agents, that give to the book agents suggestions for misrepresentation, and swindle the public through the extortionate charges that the book agents make inevitable.

This newspaper and others associated with it, hopes before long to make the book agent as extinct as the dodo, and also as extinct as the peddler that used to sell nutmegs made of wood.

An ordinary, good book sold for \$1.00 costs to make about 18 cents.

When that book which costs \$1.00 is put in the hand of the book agent, that agent or his employer must add to the actual cost and value of the book the salary, the time, the food and clothing of the book agent.

From time to time, we shall give you some information concerning book agents, and the methods of those that employ them, and the particular swindles that are invented by those expensive and successful employers of book agents.

For today these suggestions

are offered:

Spend your money on books—not on book agents.

Every book that you buy from an agent is sold to you for at least twice—and usually four times—as much as it costs to manufacture that book.

Every book that is sold to you by a book agent is sold for at least 10 times as much as it costs to manufacture that book.

You can make up your mind for yourself whether or not you want to buy a book.

Why pay a dollar to a book agent to waste your time and his time persuading you that you want the book?

Make up your mind what book you want, get them as fast as you can pay for them, and no faster.

Get books as fast as you can read them and no faster.

When a book is offered to you for so much down, and so much per month, remember that the price you are expected to pay at first is big enough to guarantee the seller against loss, in case you do not make other payments.

The book agent represents waste of time in a double sense.

He wastes his own time, and he wastes yours.

The book agent represents extravagance and dishonesty. He pretends usually that the book he is selling is sold at a low price—and it is always sold you doubt the price or more.

The book agent sells usually an inferior product, and only an inferior product offers a large margin of profit, made necessary, when a man must spend his whole day traveling from house to house with a book under his arm.

The big stores, the big manufacturers of books, that sell directly for cash are those that should be patronized.—S. F. Examiner.

DEMOCRATIC VOTE CAUSES CHANGES

Not Only Elect President, But Governors in Many Northern States.

New York.—The victory of Wilson and Marshall not only gave the democrats the presidency, but resulted in

the election of democratic governors in many states heretofore strongly republican.

Democratic governors were elected in Illinois, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New York, Ohio and Washington.

Governor Hay, of Washington, was defeated for reelection by Ernest Lister, his democratic opponent, and Governor Hawley, of Idaho, also failed of reelection, the voters favoring John M. Haines, the republican candidate.

The democrats have both houses of congress. Returns indicate a democratic majority in the lower house of 119 over all opposing strength, and a majority of at least four in the senate.

In addition to electing successors to democratic senators now sitting, democrats will displace republicans from Oregon, New Jersey, Kansas, Colorado, Montana, Delaware and Nevada.

Massachusetts' vote for Wilson was the first time the Bay state had ever favored other than a republican for president.

The hardest hit in the whole election was the loss by President Taft of his own state of Ohio to Wilson by more than 100,000 plurality.

The democratic presidential plurality in New York is the largest that state has ever given the party and it is the first time the voters outside of the metropolitan district have given a democratic presidential candidate a plurality.

Representative Longworth, son-in-law of Colonel Roosevelt, was defeated for reelection from the First Ohio district by Stanley Bowdler, democrat, by 85 votes and ex-Speaker Joe Cannon was defeated by Frank T. O'Hair, his democratic opponent, receiving a plurality of about 1200.

The election added Arizona, Kansas, Oregon and Michigan to the number of states allowing women the right of franchise.

Battle is Just Begun, Says T. R.

New York.—Theodore Roosevelt made a formal statement Monday bearing upon the election and the future of the progressive party. In line with previous expressions of his own and of his colleagues he reiterated that the "progressive party has come to stay," and "so far from being over, the battle has just begun."

He regards the party's showing in polling more than 4,000,000 votes in the face of numerous obstacles naturally in the path of a new movement as "literally unparalleled in the history of free government."

14 Dead, 90 Hurt in Train Wreck

New Orleans.—Fourteen persons were killed and 90 hurt in a wreck on the Yazoo & Mississippi Valley railroad. Railway officials say the wreck was caused by the negligence of a flagman.

Bryce Resigns His Washington Post

Washington.—James Bryce, British ambassador to the United States, has tendered his resignation and will return to England.

Salem.—Advocating employment of a few competent clerks by the state legislature and also a move on the part of that body to refuse to consider any appropriation bill that is introduced during the last half of the session, Governor West has outlined "distinct points which will be the main foundation of his economy program which he will place before the next legislative assembly."

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Railroad Enjoins County.

Hood River.—The Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company has filed suit, against Hood River

county, to have the county quit work on the railroad right of way around Hood River mountain, where Governor West has placed a force of convicts to construct a grade, connecting Hood River with Multnomah county with a wagon road, and which was intended as a link in the proposed Pacific highway from the western section of the state through central Oregon and on to California.

Morson Appeal Denied by Department

Salem.—Word has been received by Governor West from the interior department that the appeal of J. E. Morson from the commissioner of the general land office in the case of the reservoir for the Deschutes Land company has been denied, and that the granting of a site for the reservoir must await the investigation of the government as to the status of that company.

LEGISLATURE IS REPUBLICAN

Returns Show They Elected 13 of 15 Senators and 54 of 60 for House.

Portland.—Incomplete returns from the different senatorial and representative districts throughout the state indicate that the 27th biennial session of the Oregon legislature will be overwhelmingly republican. The republicans have apparently elected 13 of the 15 state senators and 54 of the 60 representatives. With two democratic holdover senators out of 15, the democrats will have four seats and the republicans 24 at the next session of the state senate and out of a total membership of 90, there will be 10 democrats and 80 republicans.

The measures carried at Tuesday's election were: Woman's suffrage, amendment (306-307) permitting tax classifications, repeal of county tax option, amendment doubling liability of bank stockholders, state-wide public utilities act, eight-hour law affecting public works, act permitting employment of convicts on roads, act permitting employment of city and county prisoners on roads, limitation on state road bond indebtedness, limitation on county road bond indebtedness, tax exemption on household effects, railroad rate bill.

The measures defeated were: Majority rule on amendments, majority rule on bills, Cascade county, grange road bonding act, state printer bill, hotel inspector, harmony state bonding act for roads, tax exemption on moneys and credits, inheritance tax law, southern Oregon road act, abolishment of state senate, single tax, capital punishment abolishment measure, two university referendums.

The figures now available on the state at large, including Multnomah, give the following totals:

For president—Wilson, 40,058; Roosevelt, 31,964; Taft, 29,529.

For United States senator—Lane, 34,168; Selling, 32,943; Bourne, 29,529; Clark, 9191; Paget, 4168.

In the first congressional district W. C. Hawley is elected by a plurality of more than 10,000. Sinnott is also far ahead of his opponent but the count is too incomplete to base an estimate upon. Secretary of State Olcott in the incomplete returns has a plurality of 30,000. Judge Eakin has been re-elected to the supreme bench. In the contest for railroad commissioner in the second district, C. W. Altchison has a lead of nearly 6,000 over his nearest competitor. Melle is elected dairy and food commissioner.

October Lumber Shipments Large

Astoria.—During the month of October, 23 vessels loaded at the mills in the lower Columbia river district and their combined cargoes amounted to 30,476,436 feet of lumber. Eight vessels carrying 10,404,712 feet of lumber went to foreign ports, while 25 vessels with cargoes aggregating 20,071,724 feet of lumber sailed for domestic ports, principally in California.

Cadet Officers Named at O. A. C.

Corvallis.—To fill vacancies in the commanding staff of the Oregon Agricultural College cadet regiment, Commandant W. C. Miller has issued a general order announcing a number of new appointments and promotions which were approved by the college administration.

Ten Horses Burn in Roseburg Fire

Roseburg.—The whole north end of Roseburg was endangered by fire when the Banks & Welker livery stable caught fire and burned to the ground during a 20-mile gale. The loss will be \$20,000. Ten head of horses perished.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Nancy Riddle Kincaid, mother of ex-Secretary of State Kincaid, died at Eugene, aged 97 years.

Starting Wednesday the State Federation of Women's Clubs held its 12th annual convention at Portland.

It is probable the women of Salem will have first opportunity to vote in Oregon as the city election comes December 2.

The body of Captain Jacobson, one of the victims of the "Osprey," was found on the coast east of Marshfield, and taken to San Francisco for burial.

William Campbell, 30 years old, was run over and killed near Tillamook by a train on the Pacific Railway & Navigation company's line. Both legs were cut off.

Baker voted down an attempt to return to the councilmanic government by a 3 to 2 vote, and upheld the commission form, which has been in vogue there for the past two years.

outs grown in Oregon will be distributed to visitors at the Minneapolis Land Show, November 12-23.

The annual meeting of the Oregon State Teachers association, western division, will be held in Portland, at the Lincoln high school, on the three days following Christmas, December 26, 27 and 28.

According to the report of Portland's municipal free employment bureau, a total of 2458 persons were furnished with employment during the month of October. Of this number 214 were women.

President Kerr and Dean Cordley, of the school of agriculture, left Corvallis Wednesday for Atlanta, Ga., to attend the annual convention of the American Association of Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations.

As a result of the election Oregon will have two county judges who are brothers. D. B. McKnight, of Albany, was elected judge of Linn county and his brother, George McKnight, of Vale, was elected judge of Malheur county.

L. Alva Lewis and Stanley G. Jewett, of the United States Biological Survey, are in Klamath Falls for the purpose of marking the boundaries of the bird preserve on the Lower Klamath lake and of that at Clear Lake, California.

W. K. Newell, of Gaston, was appointed by Governor West as a member of the board of regents of the University of Oregon to succeed J. E. Alinsworth, whose resignation was tendered some time ago, and which has just been accepted.

Claiming that the recent local option elections held at Sutherlin and Glendale, Douglas county, were not conducted in accordance with the state election laws, District Attorney Brown was asked to intercede and set aside the verdict of the voters.

Papers have been signed whereby the Falls City Milling company contracted to put in a sawmill at Independence that will cut not less than 100,000 feet of lumber in a day of 40 hours. It is understood the company will open up the Siletz timber belt.

The Northwest Smelting & Refining company filed a complaint with the state railroad commission against the Sumpter Valley and O. W. R. & N. railroads, stating that no joint routes or rates exist between those roads, and demanding that such be established.

The Hawley Pulp & Paper company of Oregon City, has planned extensive improvements of its plant, which will give it the greatest capacity of any plant on the coast for the manufacture of fruit, tissue and wrapping paper, and will result in the employment of about 150 additional men.

Election returns indicate that four of the six harmony road bills submitted at the recent election by the harmony committee appointed by Governor West may carry, and also one of the grange bills, leaving two harmony bills, one grange bill and the bill submitted by good roads advocates of Jackson county defeated.

For the purpose of securing funds to cooperate with the government in dredging a 30 foot channel over the Coos Bay bar and deepening the present 18 foot inside channel to 25 feet, the commissioners of the port are advertising the sale of 5 per cent gold bonds of the Port of Coos Bay, which aggregate \$300,000 in principal.

With the failure to abolish capital punishment in Oregon there are five men to hang at the state penitentiary on Friday, December 13, who have been reprieved by the governor until that date. They are Mike Morgan, Frank Garrison, Noble Paulsen, John W. Taylor and Jack Roberts. In addition to these John and George Humphreys are at the prison, pending an appeal.

In carrying out its scheme for the electrification of the Willamette valley and the establishment of a canal service of the utmost importance to Portland business interests, the Portland, Eugene & Tappan railway company purchased from the Astoria Railway, Light & Power company the nine mile stretch of railway track known as the Willamette Falls Railway, and in part will utilize the old road as a portion of the new main line from Portland to Salem.
