NORTH PACIFIC MAKING MOVE

Reported They are to Parallel O. S. L.

From Papers Filed in Multnomah County the East and West Line Probable

Papers were filed recently at the county seat of Multnomah county for large quantities of land in that county and the supposition is that a forerunner of a move on the part of the Hill lines to make their proposed east and west line a fact in the near future.

The line will run south west from Vale and probably reach Eugene in Lane county as one of its main centers in the Willamette Valley.

The Monitor believes that when the Hill and Harriman companies have built their fast through lines across Central Oregon this valley, south of Portland will be benefited as much, if not more than they are now being benefited through the present railroads electrifying the present lines.

All fast eastern traffic will come through the valley and thousands of people will get glimpses of the paradise valley of Oregon who never would have seen any part of the valley but Portland, Eastern Oregon markets will be brought to the doors of the valley and the diversified products of this section will find a profitable market across the divide in Oregon and Idaho.

This development together with the completion of the Panama canal will mean big

things for Oregon and this land located empire will build faster than any section of the U. S. in the next few years.
