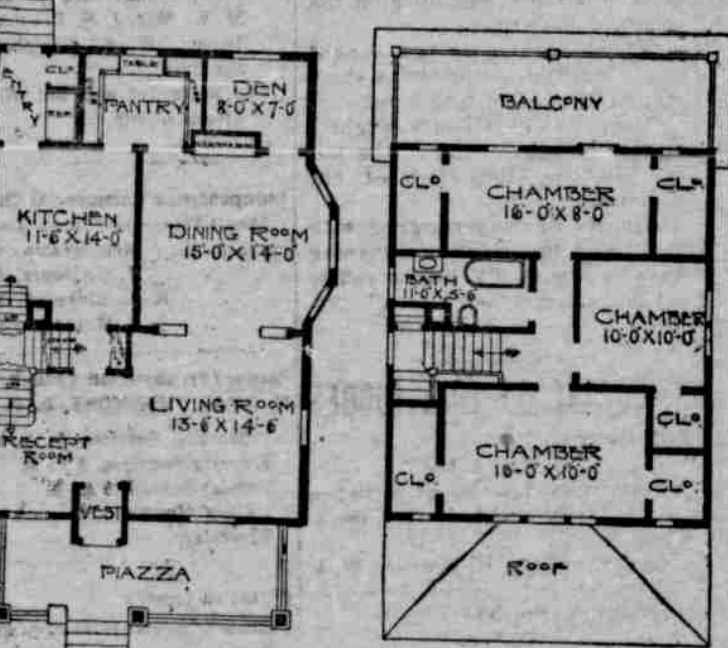

The kitchen is connected with dining room through large pantry with built-in cupboard. Kitchen has rear entry, with mop and broom closet and space for refrigerator. There is a full basement under the house seven feet deep. First story, nine feet; second story, eight feet. These heights in the clear. Size over main part, twenty-six feet wide and thirty feet deep. Birch or white maple floors throughout first and second story. Birch or red oak finish in first story and pine to paint in second story. Cost to build, exclusive of heating and plumbing, \$2,800.
