

Two Prominent Turks In The Balkan Peace Conference

NAZIM PASHA, the Turkish minister of war, who accompanied the delegates from his country to the peace conference in London, was one of the chief, though not active, figures in the negotiations. Made for Concealment.
Stick insects, which are so called because of their resemblance to dry sticks, have two forelegs, which they fold over their eyes when disturbed and evidently think that in so doing they are lost to view. The eggs of these insects take over six months to hatch. They are only one-tenth of an inch in their widest part, yet an insect which at hatching is three-quarters of an inch in length is packed into them. The stick insects destroy the weaklings by eating their legs.

Women Roadmakers.
Germany's roads are maintained in their high state of smoothness and durability largely through the efforts of women, who, like some American convicts, break stones to pay their road taxes. Mothers with their infants can be seen sitting on a pile of large stones breaking them. Only those who are too poor to pay their road tax are forced to "make little ones out of big ones."
