Notice of Proposed Street Improvements.

Notice is hereby given that the City Council of Independence, Oregon, proposes to improve Monmouth street from West line of 2nd street to a line 205 feet West of the West line of 7th street; and by improving a strip 20 feet wide in the center of said Monmouth street from a line 205 feet West of the West line to 7th street to a line 240 feet West of the West line of 7th street, all within the City of Independence, Oregon, by building or causing to be built thereon and upon the established grades of said parts of said streets Bituminate Pavement, 1 1/2-inch wearing surface and 4-inch concrete base the full width of said parts of said street, extending from curb line to curb line, excepting said 35-foot strip, which will be paved the full width of 20 feet; and by grading said parts of said streets to said sub-grade, and by constructing concrete curb-lines thereon in form and manner and at the distances from property lines as by ordinances of said city provided, which ordinances are hereby referred to and made a part of this Notice: That said work shall be done according to plans and specifications thereof prepared by Linden-Kibbe Construction Company, and now on file in the Recorder's office of said City, and marked, "Plans & Specifications for proposed improvements of certain parts of Monmouth, 2nd, B, D, E and 1st streets, agreeable with resolutions Nos. 115 and 166 relating thereto," which plans and specifications are hereby referred to and made a part of this Notice for the purpose of identifying and determining the kind and nature of said proposed street improvements, the manner in which the same shall be so improved, the width and thickness of such proposed improvements and the kind and nature of the materials to be used in the construction of the same and all other information necessary to an intelligent understanding of said proposed street improvements. Also the estimated cost of said proposed street improvements as prepared by J. W. Morris, the engineer, which are on file in said City Recorder's office in said City, and can be seen and examined at said office (That said plans, specifications and estimated cost can be seen and examined by any person at any time between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. of each day in the week, except Sunday, at the office of said City Recorder in the Cooper Building on "C" street in said City); That all of said proposed street improvements will be made and done at the cost of the abutting property thereto, except City Squares, which will be done at the cost of the City and paid for from the general fund of said City; and will be done under the supervision of the Street Commissioner unless otherwise ordered by the City Council.

Notice is hereby given: That the City Council will meet at the Council Chambers in the City Hall of said City on the 23rd day of June, 1913, at 8 p. m. thereof for the purpose of assessing, ascertaining and determining the probable cost of said proposed improvements, and to determine the proportionate part thereof, each lot, block or part thereof liable therefor shall bear, based upon the benefits conferred by reason of such improvements, and the probable cost thereof will be assessed against such property, except City Squares which shall be paid for by the City. Remonstrances against said proposed street improvements may be made at said time and place to the City Council, as follows: All resident property owners, if capable of appearing before the City Council at said time and place, shall appear personally and enter his remonstrance, otherwise he may file his individual remonstrance in writing with the City Recorder prior to said date, and all non-resident abutting property owners on said parts of said Monmouth street, may likewise file their or his remonstrance in writing with said City Recorder prior to said date, at which time and place said City Council will hear and pass upon such remonstrances, if any.
