

DEMONSTRATION TRAIN

Is Interesting Exhibit of Dairy and Hogs

The demonstration train sent out by the O. A. C. in connection with experts on dairying and hog raising reached Independence Monday at 8:00 a. m. and quite a crowd of interested spectators were present to listen to the talks made by the experts and professors from the schools.

There were three thoroughbred cows in the exhibit and from a dairy standpoint these cows were analyzed, telling how to judge a good milk producer and a well developed cow.

One of the best lectures here was made by J. M. Dickson, a practical dairy man of Shedd's, who recommended keeping a record of every cow in the herd so as to keep a check on your stock and also on your milkers, your feed, etc. He explained how he had built up his herd until he had a money making herd of cattle that was getting better each year. Chris Myhre followed him. Dr. Withycombe, Professors Hetzel, Graves, Potter, Fitts, Samson, Barr and Robinson represented the college and gave short talks during the two hour stay in this city.

From Independence they went to Dallas where they gave lectures.

President Alice Stone Blackwell of New England, woman suffrage association of Dorchester, Mass., who is also editor in chief of the Woman's Journal of Boston, has written to Dr. Calvin S. White asking his opinion of the effects of suffrage on the health of women. Her letter is as follows: In a recent article against equal suffrage William Sedgewick predicts that it must have a harmful effect on the health of mothers and consequently to their children. For years the anti-suffragettes have been prophesying that political excitement would cause nervous diseases and insanity among women if they were allowed to vote. She asks: Do you find that equal suffrage does produce these disasters or any other as unsexing women, breaking up the home, destroying chivalry. A line from you would be much appreciated. Dr. White replied that no such dire results had followed in Oregon and could see no reason for such effects predicted by Professor Sedgewick.
