Express Rates Have Been Re-arranged

Organizing the Boys and Girls

A press bulletin from the Corvallis Agricultural College says: The work of organizing boys' and girls' clubs in every school district of Oregon has already been begun. Polk county schools, which were pretty thoroughly organized through the dairy record keeping association, were first line in the new movement. Even before the club bulletins and constitutions were ready for general circulation; County School Superintendent Seymour had organized the workers' clubs in fifty of the school districts.

The work is also well under way in some of the other counties. Supt. Cannon, assisted by Mr. Cross, a graduate student of the O. A. C., who is doing research work in rural school organizations, has begun the work of organizing clubs in Benton county. Progress is reported from other parts the state, and there is every reason to believe that the entire state will be organized by the close of the spring terms.
