Strawberry Mousse.

Take for one quart of rich cream one pound of fresh fruit washed through a fine strainer. Mix with four table-spoonsful of sugar, set the pan over the fire and stir until the sugar is dissolved thoroughly. Remove from the fire and add one tablespoonful of gelatin which has been dissolved in a little cold water. Stand on ice until thoroughly chilled. Mix two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar and one teaspoonful of vanilla extract with the cream and whip thoroughly, adding little by little the chilled strawberry juice sweetened to taste. Pour into a mold, cover very tightly and pack in ice and salt for three hours.
