IN THE WORLD OF SPORT

Tommy Hughitt, Michigan's Star Quarterback.

The University of Michigan suffered an almost irreparable loss when Tom Hughitt, pilot of Yost's football squad and pronounced one of the best quarterbacks in the west, sustained injuries that may keep him out of the game for the balance of the season. Michigan has no substitute available who approaches Hughitt in all around ability. In fact, Michigan has produced few men to equal him. The Wolverines were playing Michigan Aggies when the accident to Hughitt occurred. His loss to Michigan is regarded by Coach Yost as a calamity, equaling in importance the elimination of Brickley from the Harvard lineup.

Army-Navy Agreement.

After much discussion a plan binding the West Point and Annapolis academies to play an annual Army and Navy football game for five years has been agreed on.

The plan stipulates that the two schools will choose the site for the games alternately, the Navy having the preference this year.

The game will be played this year in Philadelphia on Franklin field or Shibe park and the Navy will also choose the site in 1916 and 1918, while the Army will make the selection in 1915 and 1917. The Army will in all probability select the New York Polo grounds as the scene of conflict. This agreement covers the next five years.

Wisconsin Drops Rowing.

Wisconsin is definitely out of the Poughkeepsie regatta for next year. The University of Wisconsin regents have adopted without change the recommendation of the faculty that intercollegiate rowing contests be temporarily discontinued pending further development of intermural athletic sports.

In fourteen years the Badgers have failed to win the big varsity race at Poughkeepsie. They finished second in 1900, third in 1901, second in 1902 and third in 1903. From then until 1912 they finished in the ruck, taking second place two years ago.

Big Leagueers Join Feds.

Thirty-five American and National league players have signed with the Federal league for next season, according to a statement made by W. T. McCullough, secretary of the Pittsburgh Federal league club. He declared that eight of these men had signed
