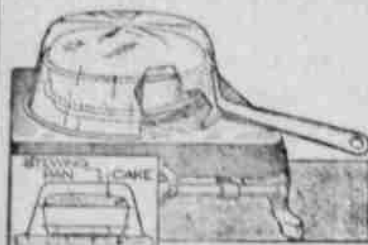

Easily Made Substitute For a Gas Stove Oven.



Wishing to bake a nice loaf cake one afternoon for dinner and finding that the fire in my range had gone out, I remembered an oven shown me at one time for use on a small gas plate, which consisted of a cover, a bottom piece and a support for the pan, writes a correspondent of Popular Mechanics. The thought came to me that with all my pots and pans I ought to be able to get some results by the combination of two pie tins, a cake pan and a saw-pan, and on trial it baked as fine a cake as any one could wish.

A small pie tin was placed in a larger one, as shown. On this was placed the cake pan filled with the cake batter, and over the whole was placed the saw-pan, which acted as a heat retainer or oven. A good hot flame was used at first and was then gradually turned lower until the cake was finished.

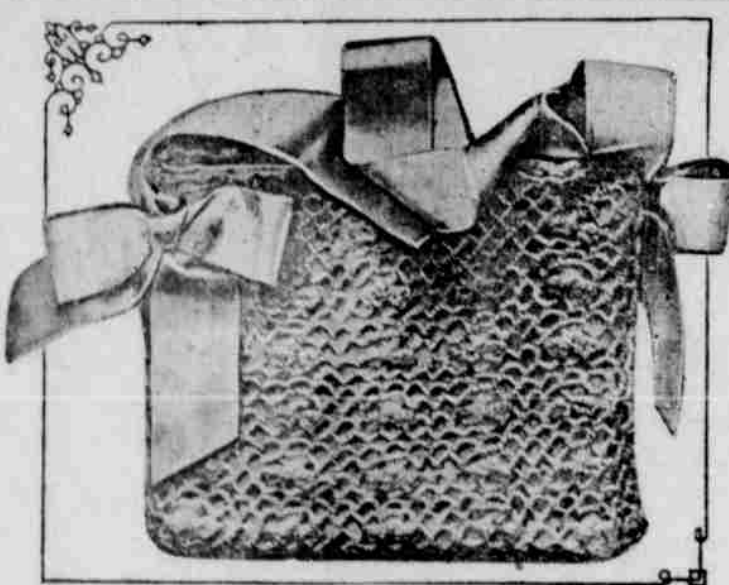
Mock Sweetbreads.

Wash fresh tripe thoroughly in several waters and put it into cold water and boil until thoroughly soft and tender, changing the water once, and cut it into dice. Make a rich, thick cream sauce and add a little white stock if it is at hand; season with salt, paprika and a tiny grating of nutmeg; add the diced tripe and pour very hot over rounds of toast. Garnish with small points of dry toast and sprinkle a little finely chopped parsley over all.—Country Gentleman.

Sweet Pepper Mayonnaise.

A sweet pepper mayonnaise is a good relish. Mince two or three red Spanish peppers. Pound them in a mortar to a smooth paste and add them by degrees to a mayonnaise dressing. This makes a delicious sauce to use with boiled fish, especially with fish that has rather dry flesh.

A Crocheted Bag For Various Daily Uses



SO CONVENIENT.

THIS dainty little bag may be used for handkerchiefs, and, enlarged, for a nightgown holder, or to keep your darning in.

Materials Required.—1 ball of sky blue crochet cotton, a suitable steel hook, white satin for the lining and 3/4 yard of sky blue ribbon.

Make 107 ch.

1st row—Miss 6, 1 d c in the 7th st. * 5 ch, miss 4 st of the foundation, 1 d c in the next st; repeat from *.

2nd row—5 ch, 1 d c in the first loop, * 5 ch, 1 d c in the following space; repeat from *.

3rd row—5 ch, 1 d c in the first space, * 3 ch, 5 tr in the centre st of the following space, 5 tr in the centre st of the following space, 3 ch, 1 d c in the next space; repeat from * to the end of the row.

4th row—5 ch, 1 d c in the 1st space, * 5 ch, 1 d c in the 1st tr of the next clump of 5 tr, 3 ch, 5 tr in the st connecting the two clumps, 3 ch, 1 d c in the 1st st of the second clump, 5 ch, 1 d c in the next space; repeat from * to the end of the row.

5th row—5 ch, 1 d c in the first space, * 5 ch, 1 d c in the first treble of the clump, 5 ch, 1 d c in the last treble of the clump, 5 ch, 1 d c in the next space, 5 ch, 1 d c in the next space; repeat from * to the end of the row.

Repeat from the 2nd row 5 times.

Then work 1 more row as the second row and break off the thread.

Make 107 ch, and work a second piece to match the first. Do not break off the thread at the end of this second portion.

Place the two pieces together, and join the two sides and the bottom as follows—1 d c in the first space of each piece taken together, * 5 ch, 1 d c in the next space along the edge; repeat from * until the top of the second side is reached.

Round the top of the bag work * 6 ch, miss 2 ch, 1 d c in the 3rd, 2 ch, 1 d c in the next space at the edge of the bag; repeat from * and at the end of the round join to the 1st st.

Line the bag with white satin and trim with ribbon and bows as illustrated.
