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Care of Gloves.

When putting gloves on, always begin by buttoning the second button, then, when buttoned to the top, you can easily fasten the first button without tearing the lid. Never remove the glove by pulling the fingers, but by drawing the part covering the wrist across the hand and leaving them thus wrong side out for some time before turning them to their proper shape. Always lay gloves lengthwise; never roll them.
