INDEPENDENCE SOLDIER BOY BUYS LIBERTY BOND

Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, June 6.—Dear Father: You will do me a great favor by investing \$100 of my money in a Liberty Bond. Please send it to me, so I can show my friends I am helping my country in two ways. One as a soldier ready to go to France, the other as a buyer of a Liberty Bond, so the government can buy war supplies with it.

The government has given all of us soldiers a raise in our pay of \$15 per month. As a private my pay is \$30 and I have been promoted to the grade of first class which brings \$3 more a month. That gives me \$33 a month at the present time, and the future looks bright for me as I will be able to advance higher and therefore raise my pay still higher, but it will take time. This raise in pay is only as long as the war lasts.
