In order to stimulate individual subscriptions to the Third Liberty Loan, a create community activity and to mobilize, systemize and unify the initiative and energy of citizens and districts in the accomplishment of a national purpose, an honor flag and honor roll system has been adopted by the Treasury Department for the Third Liberty Loan.

This system is outlined by the Department as follows:

1. A specially designed honor flag, officially adopted as the Third Liberty Loan flag, will be awarded to all communities upon their attainment of their assigned quota.
2. A small individual poster, containing a reproduction of the honor flag and a blank for the name of the subscriber, will be awarded to each subscriber for display in his home.
3. A large honor roll, containing at the top a reproduction of the honor flag and the slogan, "Help Our Town Win the Right to Fly This Flag," and below space for the names of all subscribers, will be posted in a conspicuous place in the community.
4. A large honor flag will be awarded to each state upon the attainment of its quota, the state flag to contain the names of those subordinate groups which have attained their quotas.
5. A national honor flag will be unfurled at Washington on which will be presented the returns from all the states.

Department of Domestic Science

Miss Rigdon, a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College, specialized in the course of Home Economics, and has consented to assume charge of this department. Inquiries freely answered all.

The appeal is coming stronger and stronger from the food commission to the "Mothers" of our nation. It is the mother who regulates the amount of food and the kind of food which her family is to have to make them strong and healthy boys and girls. It is "Mother" who decides if Johnny may have another piece of bread and butter, or a dish of rice and cream, or perhaps a lovely rice fritter with golden corn syrup over it. Don't you think that Johnny would just as soon have the fritter as a substitute for bread if it were made attractive and appetizing and placed before him in a positive, not negative manner?

Experts tell us that the substitute cereals for wheat have the same food and fuel values as the wheat, so why not use them as much as we possibly can, for what we save feeds another soldier. I know of one home where there is a large family and they are having one meal a day without bread. If one home can do it, why not others? The meal where bread would be the least missed is our dinner, for then we usually serve our heaviest and largest meal.

In place of the raised or yeast breads we have a great number of "quick" breads or "hot" breads and a few of these are as follows:

Oat Meal Muffins (level measure)
One half cup milk; 1 cup cooked oat meal or rolled oats; 1 egg; 2 tablespoons fat; 1 1-2 cups flour; 2 tablespoons sugar; 1-2 teaspoon salt; 4 teaspoons baking powder.

Cook oatmeal, using one part oatmeal to two parts water. A large proportion of water makes too soft a mush and gummy muffins. Mix milk, oatmeal, egg and melted fat. Add dry ingredients after sifting them together. Bake 25 to 30 minutes. This makes 10 to 12 muffins.

Golden Corn Cake
One cup corn meal; 1 cup flour; 1-4 cup sugar; 5 teaspoons baking powder; 3-4 teaspoon salt; 1 cup milk; 1 egg, 2 tablespoons fat. Mix and sift dry ingredients; and milk, egg well beaten and butter. Bake in shallow buttered pan in hot oven for 20 minutes.

Corn Meal Griddle Cakes
One cup milk, 3-4 cup flour, 3-4 cup corn meal, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg. Add beaten egg to milk and add to dry materials, well mixed.

Rice Waffles
One cup milk, 1 1-2 tablespoons fat, 1 egg, 1-2 cup cooked rice, 1 1-2 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder.

Heat milk and fat and the beaten yolk of the egg. Then sift in flour and beat well adding last the beaten white of egg, the cooked rice and baking powder. Beat the batter for two minutes and cook on a hot well greased waffle iron. Serve with syrup, honey or jelly.
