

Oregon Wins Prizes.

Oregon was awarded a number of prizes at the Irrigation Congress at Sacramento last week. Through the entry made by Klamath county the state received the award of the handsome trophy given by ex-Governor Pardee for the best collective state exhibit of forage plants.

J. Frank Adams, of Klamath county, won the Holstein bull offered by the California Promotion Committee for the best exhibits of products of a single irrigated farm.

The trophy offered by the Pabst Brewing Company for the best exhibit of hops grown by irrigation was won by E. Clemens Horst Company, Salem.

The sugar beet trophy will be awarded upon the analysis of beets entered, and this will include those from Klamath and Malheur counties, that were entered for Oregon.

The fruit exhibit of Malheur and Klamath counties won for Oregon the trophy of Mr. Pardee for fruits.

N. S. Merrill, Merrill, received the \$100 cash prize for the best exhibit of vegetables from a single irrigated garden while Walter Campbell and J. M. Driscoll, of Bonanza, each won prizes of \$50 for the respective exhibits of sheaf barley and sheaf oats entered by them, these last three named being part of the Klamath county exhibit.

J. A. Lockey, of Ontario, received \$100 cash prize for the best collective exhibit of pears, and A. A. Brown, of Ontario, the \$100 for the best exhibit of alfalfa.
