saloon men, but of the Prohibition people as well, and on his trial quite a number of business men of Ashland, regardless of their standing on the saloon question, testified that his reputation for truth and veracity was bad. The robbery occurred on July 25th. Kiso had been arrested and searched at Ashland on the evening of July 4th and had on him only \$1.60. He was kept in jail and released on the morning of the 5th after he had been fined five dollars and ordered out of town on his promise to return the five dollars as soon as he could earn it. He came to Medford on the morning of July 5th and visited a number of the saloons there, trying to obtain drinks on credit, which seems to be his principal occupation, although he testified on the stand that his main occupation was in putting down the saloon trade. His manner of operation seemed to be that he wanted to drink up all the booze so that the saloons would have no more to sell, and therefore the country would have to be dry, and this, unfortunately for Kiso, was the heartless way that an unfeeling jury of twelve men good and true, considered his case. There were over twenty witnesses at the trial and a large number of them testified to having seen him with the prosecuting witness, Watkins, and the defendant's ruler was found under the bridge where Watkins was robbed. Within a few minutes after the robbery, Kiso began to display signs of wealth, bought himself a large number of clothes and took the train north, but, unfortunately for him, the telephone service was in perfect order, and when the officers at Grants Pass went through his pockets and found on him the marked currency, they refused to let him go on his way rejoicing but, returned him to Jacksonville for trial. He was long on explanations however and explained minutely to the jury that a friend of his, whom he had not seen since, had handed him the money while enroute from Ashland to Medford on the morning of July 5th; and it did not seem to bother him at all when Deputy District Attorney Reames asked him on cross-examination, why, if he had all this money on him at the time he reached Medford, was it necessary for him to be trying to get drinks on credit. The jury deliberated a short time and brought in a verdict of guilty. When the time came to pass sentence, the prisoner stood before the court and spoke feelingly of his family and particularly of his aged mother. He does not appear to be a bad sort of a fellow, although the evidence plainly showed him to be a crook. The sentence was three years and a half in the penitentiary and he was taken down Wednesday night by Sheriff Jackson.

Tuesday the attention of the court and jury was occupied by the trial of the State vs. L. V. Anderson of Medford charged with a statutory crime. The trial brought a large crowd and a large number of witnesses testified on both sides. It was one of those peculiar class of cases where, although the jury believed that the acts complained of had probably been committed, they were to some extent excused by the action of the prosecuting witness. In this case the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty. A large number of jurors hesitate before bringing in a verdict on trials of this character, where the reputation of the complaining witness is not of the best.

The district attorney, A. E. Reames, who is in Portland assisting Receiver Devlin in untangling the affairs of the

defunct Oregon Banking & Trust Co., could not be present and his ever efficient deputy, C. L. Reames, had all of the prosecution of the above cases in charge. Mr. Reames did some fine work for the State and has received a great deal of praise and congratulation for the manner in which he conducted the cases. Clarence is an attorney of great ability, and an excellent orator, and is fast gaining a reputation for himself in the legal affairs of Southern Oregon. We predict a great future for him. Attorney Gus Newbury appeared in each of the above cases for the defendants.

The attorneys for the plaintiff in the damage case were Mattingly & Phipps, and for the defendant Mr. Colvig and Mr. Leiter.
