

SOLDIER-SAILOR ENCAMPMENT

Southern Oregon Fighting Men Hold Reunion at Ashland This Week.

This week the old soldiers and sailors of southern Oregon are having the time of their lives at Ashland. Frank Kashafer, G. 99th Pennsylvania and Owen Keegan, K. 10th Minnesota, are in attendance from Jacksonville. Programs were rendered every evening at the Chautauqua tabernacle, and large crowds were in attendance as each performance. The first program took place Monday evening, the large auditorium being full, besides the program Mayor F. H. Carter delivered an appropriate address of welcome and Col. A. J. T. Smith of Gold Hill responded on behalf of the association and the old soldiers and sailors.

At the business meeting of the association, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Commander, H. B. Alberson, of Grants Pass; Lieutenant Colonel, J. H. Wills, of Ashland; Major, J. W. Hicks, of Central Point; Chaplain, Rev. J. S. Smith of Ashland. The time and place of holding the next encampment will be determined in the future by the newly elected officers.

Oregon Death Rate.

The semi-annual report recently issued by the State Board of Health is proof of the fact that the death rate in Oregon is extremely low. The percentage, based on a population of 600,000, is computed at eight in 1000. An interesting fact in connection with the report is that of the total number of 2408 deaths that occurred during the half year 110 were from old age. Of the total number of deaths reported, 255 were due to tuberculosis, averaging one death out of every ten. Typhoid fever claimed 35 victims, diphtheria 30, 101 to whooping cough, cerebro-meningitis, erysipelas, etc., making a total of 166 deaths due to infectious diseases other than tuberculosis. Deaths due to diseases of the circulatory system numbered 283, and 310 were credited to disease of the respiratory system other than tuberculosis; 241 to pneumonia, 128 to disease of the kidneys, 124 to diseases of the digestive system; 219 persons met violent deaths during the six months covered by the report, of which 28 were suicides.
