

## H. M. CAKE WILL SPEAK

**Candidate for United States  
Senator will Address Jack-  
sonville People.**

Jacksonville people will be pleased to learn that H. M. Cake, who is a Republican candidate for United States Senator upon Statement No. 1, will address them at the court house auditorium Saturday evening, March 28. Mr. Cake believes that the people should elect the senators and he will address the people of Jacksonville along that line.

Mr. Cake recently resigned as president of the Portland Commercial Club and has shown his ability as a booster for Oregon in many different ways. Two years ago he was a candidate for the senatorship against Jonathan Bourne, who won by a small plurality. He has friends and admirers all over this great state of Oregon and is one of the ablest speakers in the state.

Ordinarily Jacksonville is slighted when such important men as Mr. Cake make a tour of the valley, and every man and woman in the city should attend the meeting and give him a hearty greeting. He is on the popular side of the political question—Statement No. 1. That is the election of United States Senators by a direct vote of the people.

I hope to have the pleasure of addressing as many republican voters as possible and am confident that my message to them will be of interest to all who are concerned in the result of the coming election."

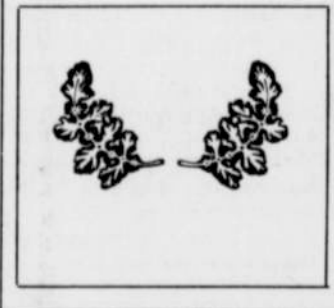
